Jubilee money helps local groups

Bridport's Lyric Theatre is among several community groups in the area receiving grants through Arts Council England and UK Community Foundations to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The Friends of the Lyric Theatre CIC, which runs the Barrack Street theatre, will receive just over £7,000, while Burrough Harmony mental health drop-in centre will receive around £3,000.

Rare birds are doing well in our town

A survey of breeding birds in Bridport and West Bay has revealed that the area is home to some of the UK's most threatened species. The peregrine falcon, firecrest, hobby, nightingale, swift and yellowhammer were all recorded in and around the town. Numbers are much higher than anticipated and 14% more than the national average for a search area of the same size. The survey, led by conservation biologist Tom Brereton for Bridport Bird Club, found 81 species breeding or attempting to breed within a mile of the urban areas of Bridport and West Bay and the proposed development site at Vearse Farm.

Come and join The Bridge's team of volunteers

The Bridge is still looking for a volunteer distribution coordinator for St Mary's Bridport. The role involves sorting about 1,500 copies into rounds for deliverers to collect, and communicating with those deliverers as necessary. The sorting takes two or three hours (with help) on a Friday 10 times a year (not December or July). If you're interested please contact the editor (details on p2). We always need more volunteer deliverers, too, to cover parts of the town where there are gaps.



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West Bay woman is collecting vital supplies for Ukrainian diabetics

Chris Ivory, who lives in West Bay, has been collecting supplies to send to Ukraine to help people suffering from diabetes who have had to flee the warzones there.



She has already sent five large parcels and is still collecting in the hope of being able to send more.

Chris says: "Thank you to everyone who has supported the appeal for medical supplies and food for diabetic children and adults in Ukraine. I have been overwhelmed by the kindness and generosity of friends, neighbours and local businesses. The cash gifts I received meant I could buy compression socks, another necessity.

"My son was a young teenager when he was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes 19 years ago, and recently my attention was drawn to an appeal from a diabetic medical supply company, *typeonestyle.com*. Donations are going to the refugees in desperate need."

Chris is collecting the following items, as well as cash: sweets, chocolate bars (Mars/Snickers type); cereal bars and protein bars; glucose and dextrose tablets and glucose gel; blood-testing meters, strips, lancets and needles.

IN THE PINK: The curate, altar and at least one member of the congregation at St Swithun's were dressed in rose pink to mark Refreshment Sunday (a.k.a. Mothering Sunday) on 27 March. Philip Sturrock - pictured above centre with the Revd Helen Croud, Team Curate, and Graham Williams, Verger – explains: "Rose-coloured vestments are used only twice in the church's year: mid-Lent (Refreshment) Sunday and mid-Advent Sunday. They are meant as a relief from the penitential purple of both seasons. Because rose vestments are so infrequently used, not many churches have a set. We do, however - a full High Mass set, with chasuble for the celebrant, dalmatic for the deacon and tunicle for the subdeacon. They are based on Roman civil dress and have been used in the church since the third or fourth century AD."

St Swithun's project appoints a manager

Arts and heritage consultant Crystal Johnson will be managing the ambitious project to reorder St Swithun's Church in time for its 200th birthday celebration in 2027. The parochial church council of the Bridport Team Ministry approved her appointment at its meeting on 5 April.

The steering group, chaired by St Swithun's treasurer Philip Sturrock, is planning a programme of repair and renewal at the Allington building to allow it to fulfil its Christian vocation and serve the Bridport Anglican team and the needs of the local community into the future.

Philip says: "We have big ambitions for the church and we need to consult widely about the ways to realise them. Then we shall need to run a major fundraising campaign and commission an extensive building programme. We needed a project manager with significant experience in turning ideas into reality."

Crystal's background is in museum curating and the visual arts, and she has specialised in developing and delivering heritage projects based in historic buildings. She has worked on some high-profile projects in the town, including the LSi, Bridport Museum and the Town Hall; all have been successfully completed and attracted funding from the National Heritage Lottery Fund. She is also familiar with working on religious buildings and has recently completed projects at Blandford Forum Parish Church, Exeter Cathedral and Tolpuddle Old Chapel.

The St Swithun's steering group were delighted to learn that Crystal, whose family have lived in Allington for 70 years, already knew the longest-serving member of the congregation, June Goodburn. In fact, Crystal was nursed by June when she was born!

June was churchwarden at St Swithun's when the last major development – the building of the church hall – took place in 1987 and she is now a member of the steering group. She says: "I'm delighted with our plan to allow this beautiful church to reach out beyond its current congregation to serve the local community. It was an added bonus when I saw that Crystal had been engaged to help us."

Crystal says: "I was surprised and pleased to see that June was involved in this new project. It shows just what a loyal community St Swithun's is and how committed they are to devoting time and funds to fashioning this beautiful building and its exterior for the 21st century.

"I'm looking forward to working with this team of expert architects and members of the Bridport Team community to see this wonderful project realised."

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
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New ways to support Christian Aid Week

The war in Ukraine is inevitably uppermost in our thoughts at the moment. This desperate and brutal conflict has brought devastation and ruin as well as tragic loss of life, and millions of Ukrainians have had to flee their homes.

Christian Aid, as part of the Disasters Emergency
Committee (DEC) and in its own right, is working with
three partner organisations in the ACT Alliance: Hungarian
Interchurch Aid (HIA) in Ukraine and Hungary, the
Lutheran World Federation (LWF) in Poland, and Swiss
Church Aid (HEKS) in Ukraine, Hungary and Romania.
These local partners are in Ukraine to help internally
displaced people and refugees with lifesaving aid, shelter,
food, water, sanitation and health support, as well as vital
information. Many people have responded to the DEC
appeal most generously, and have even offered homes and
support for refugees.

Meanwhile, in Zimbabwe – Christian Aid's focus this year – the climate crisis is causing aching hunger for families like Jessica Mwedzi's, who often eat only one bowl of porridge a day. The combined effects of the pandemic, conflict and drought rob women like her of the chance to earn a living with dignity. And the war in Ukraine, 7,000 miles away, is driving up food prices in Zimbabwe and elsewhere. Without the fertiliser and food – such as wheat and cooking oil – that Ukraine and Russia produce, vulnerable people are being pushed deeper into hunger.

Your donation can help this loving mum and others like her to turn hunger into hope by growing drought-tolerant crops that survive in the harsh climate and by learning how to preserve and store food for the dry season. With your church and community, you can restore some justice to the world and protect the future for our children and grandchildren.

How can you help?

A new development has come to Christian Aid Week: 'delivery-only collections'. In the past, local collectors dropped off envelopes and returned later to collect donations. Christian Aid research shows that householders now prefer not to be disturbed by collectors at the door (or on the phone) and much prefer the delivery-only method. So last year it started offering a delivery-only envelope, where the recipient is invited to make a donation at a nearby collector's address. All the collector has to do is put some posters in their window and await the envelopes.

Last year, as well as collecting from my usual roads, I also dropped off delivery-only envelopes over several days while walking my dog, Poppy. I called on everyone who had previously shown interest, and left delivery-only envelopes at houses in additional nearby roads. It was really enjoyable, and I met some wonderful additional supporters who rushed out to give me their envelopes.

Nationwide, the trial was surprisingly successful: although far fewer envelopes were returned, those that were returned held some substantial amounts, being from donors who

were keen to give to Christian Aid. So the more people who join us as delivery-only supporters, the more successful we will be this vital year. It works best if the collection point is reasonably near the drop-off point.

The 300,000-Step Challenge

Another way to raise money is through the '300,000 steps in a month' challenge. Sounds difficult? No, not necessarily. You can do this in many ways, such as:

- on your own perhaps with an energetic four-legged friend (it's 'Team Poppy' for us);
- with your family as many as want to join in, any age;
- a group of friends eat up the steps and catch up. My fellow organiser Lorna Johnson, for example, is planning to take part and is looking for walking partners to join her;
- in a small church group it's a good way to get to know each other even better;
- with neighbours, members of clubs, choirs, societies, etc. It can be really fun! You organise where, when and how: there are no rules other than achieving 300,000 steps in 31 days, starting as soon as you can in May. Just contact me for sponsorship forms. 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Helping to ensure educational excellence in our community

In the pod this month is Martin Warne, Chair of Governors at St Mary's CE Primary School.


The Bridge: Tell us a bit about your career and how your work experiences prepared you for your responsibilities as a school governor.

Martin Warne: My whole career was in social work and I spent 30 years in children's services in London, Hampshire, Somerset and Dorset. It was front-line work: safeguarding, child protection, fostering, adoption and children in care. In the early 2000s I transferred to the NHS and managed CAMHS (child and adolescent mental health services) in Weymouth, West Dorset and North Dorset – such a challenge, trying to prioritise needs when there were never enough resources to cover the load that referrers sent to the service. I retired in 2010 but went back to social services on a non-contract basis, mostly dealing with child protection cases.

There were always lots of 'blue light' emergency cases. Occasionally a particularly difficult one would get to me, but I enjoyed the satisfaction of knowing we got it right most of the time. I have to say there was a buzz in that. I think my personality equipped me to deal well with the stress and the type of work — you're either suitable for the work or you realise you aren't and you leave — and a stable home life helped a lot, too.

The role of a school governor isn't operational but we're closely involved in the school's strategic direction. We hold the head and staff to account, challenging and asking questions. My experience means I'm very aware of child protection issues; I'm also used to spotting problems and looking for solutions.

TB: You've been a governor at St Mary's twice: once in the early 90s when your children were pupils there, and now. How has the school changed in those 30 years?



MW: The biggest change is the size: in the 90s it was the biggest primary school in Bridport, with 420 children. Now there are 210. Between the two periods the school went through some rocky times, until about 2010 when it was turned around by the then headteacher and staff. This excellence continues, with high-quality leadership and staff. The school remains a nurturing, caring community for a wide cross-section of families – there's a real energy about it.

St Mary's is part of the Minerva Learning Trust, with our partner schools Burton Bradstock, Bridport Primary and Sir John Colfox. This is a thriving, rewarding arrangement and brings huge benefits in terms of the educational achievements of children in our area.

Being a governor is incredibly rewarding and we're always looking for new people to join us. I'd love anyone who's interested to get in touch!

TB: What are the greatest challenges facing children and young people today?

MW: It's a difficult time to be growing up. First, social media can create a lot of bullying, and it gives young people unrealistic expectations, too. Drugs and alcohol are also a big problem, more so than ever. The pandemic has caused real issues for young people – their education

has been interrupted and they've missed out on a lot of interaction and socialising. All this has caused so much anxiety. There's a lack of meaningful employment opportunities around here as industries decline and workplace patterns change. And those who go on to further education can end up with huge student debts. There's a lot for young people to contend with.

TB: You're very active in community life and are also a member of Bothenhampton and Walditch Parish Council. What motivates you to get involved in this way, and what do you get out of it?

MW: Our society thrives when people give their time and energy to help each other. Sometimes people think things 'just happen', but they happen because of volunteers – the parish council's footpaths officer, for example, who does such valuable work. I believe everyone should get out and help as best they can.

I certainly enjoy feeling like I've contributed to the community. As a governor, I want to ensure the school is the best it can be, and that gives me satisfaction.

TB: How do you like to relax between your various commitments?

MW: I absolutely love music and I play in a band called Smile & Wave with my friend Mike Smithwick. We both play acoustic guitar. We do gigs in Bucky Doo Square, including a recent fundraiser for Ukraine, which raised £300 in two hours. I love performing! I also enjoy exercise, particularly walking and cycling.

Governors don't have to be teachers; the ideal mix is a cross-section of people who are interested in children's wellbeing. If this is something you'd like to consider, email Martin at mwarne@stmarybridport.dorset.sch.uk.

There's plenty going on this springtime

Spring is recognised as a season in which there is blossom and flourishing; new beginnings after a period of dormancy and inactivity.

It feels a little bit like that at St Mary's at the moment; we are really enjoying the busyness and renewal of activity that's now getting into full swing following the quiet days of lockdown.

March began with the planting of a 'Golden Hornet' crabapple tree in our churchyard. This was part of the 'Plant a tree for the Jubilee' scheme and contributed to the Queen's Green Canopy (QGC), an initiative that encourages the planting of trees to create a legacy in honour of the



Queen's leadership of the nation. Supported by the Bridport Tree Planting Group, the donated sapling was planted and blessed by the team rector, the Revd Deb Smith, on Sunday 13 March (pictured above right) and has since been watered in and tended by members of the St Mary's gardening group. We have sent information about our commemorative tree to the QGC team and it now appears on the

national interactive map at *www.queensgreencanopy.org/map*. It may be that, by this means, the Queen herself is aware of our little tree!

Music has spilled out from the church in recent weeks, with wonderful concerts from chamber choir Cantamus and the New Elizabethan Singers. This year has also seen a return of our Easter tableau to the chancel of the church. Many children from our local primary schools brought difficult questions and happy chatter on their visit at the end of the spring term.

Watching the unfolding conflict in Ukraine has brought both a feeling of powerlessness and the need for prayer. We have been privileged to have had the opportunity to display the painting 'Soul by Soul and Silently' by Hugo Grenville in the Lady Chapel to act as a focus for our prayers for the people of Ukraine. The artist painted it at the start of the Syrian war, depicting the pain and chaos of war impacting on a displaced family. On Sunday 3 April churches were called to join together in an act of witness to pray and light candles for Ukraine, for an end to war and for those affected. That afternoon Hugo Grenville came to give an illustrated talk called 'Painting Hope' – the history of western art during crisis and war. Eighty people attended the event and donated nearly £400 to the Ukraine appeal.

The days lengthen and there is increasing warmth in the light of the sun. The grass is growing in the churchyard and the beautiful, first blossom on the Golden Hornet

crabapple tree appears. We trust that many who walk the path between the Community Orchard and South Street will enjoy the growth and flourishing of the little tree – a symbol of hope for days to come.

Many in the village have been supporting fundraising events for the Save the Children Fund, specifically for Ukraine. Bothenhampton and Walditch Parish Council (BWPC) organised a successful climate change event at Bothenhampton Village Hall on 26 March, organised by vice-chair Graham Styles.

A range of local environmental groups and experts came along, offering leaflets, advice and support to residents on issues such as home insulation, sustainable energy, tree planting and wildlife, growing more food locally, and electric cars and bikes. The event was introduced by Eddie Rose, a local activist, who offered a young person's

perspective about the importance of taking action on climate change. The hall was packed out, and imaginative children's activities in the spring sunshine on the John Holt play area – run by Jo Burlington of 'Oops Wow Messy Art' – meant that there was something for everyone.

Part of the event was a lively discussion led by Bridport author and environmentalist Horatio Morpurgo. This gave residents a chance to ask further questions of the expert groups and to discuss ideas about how our community might become more sustainable and environmentally aware. A range of ideas came up, including the importance of engaging with the farming community; installation of solar panels and whether planning laws should be liberalised; car share schemes; recycling collection points; road safety; and installation of bicycle shelters.

The event showed that there is a strong local interest in these issues, lots of local expertise for people to tap into, and lots of ideas to take forward on how we can work together to make our shared environment cleaner and greener. The parish council will work on future events focusing on practical actions that we can all make to adapt to a world that is changing at an ever-faster rate.

Community governance review – a personal view on the current situation

Dorset Council has asked residents for their views on its community governance review by 23 May (www. dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/community-governance-review or phone 01305 221000 for a paper copy). The review proposes abolishing the parishes of Allington, Bradpole and Bothenhampton & Walditch and recasting them as wards of Bridport Town Council. This will see the end of the two wards of Bothenhampton and Walditch and of the parish council, which was founded in 1886. It will give residents the opportunity in May 2024 to vote for three members of Bridport Town Council to represent their interests instead.

There will be no opportunity for residents to vote on the issue, since legislation does not allow for a referendum. This seems unfair. However, my colleagues and I were heartened by the 38 submissions made by local residents during the proposals phase last autumn, strongly supporting us.

None of us had served as parish councillors before my co-option in September 2018. Our new parish clerk

arrived in January 2019. During 2019 and 2020 the rest of my colleagues were elected or co-opted and we have all enjoyed learning our responsibilities and helping residents with planning and other issues. Little did we know, until last autumn, that Bridport Town Council had long harboured designs on our precept. Apparently their first attempt was in 1947, but that was subject to the decision of the residents, who voted against it. A fully worked-out bid was proposed in January 2017, but Dorset County Council advised waiting until the formation of Dorset Council. So here we are, with only a couple of weeks left for residents to respond to the proposal that we should be abolished.

Once Dorset Council has finally ratified its decision, taking into account the new information provided by residents, it will come into effect in May 2024.

Your parish councillors have already created a parish plan for 2022–27 and they fully intend to proceed with it, come what may. The plan is published online at www.bothenhamptonwalditchparishcouncil.com.

Our 2020 survey of residents told us that their greatest concerns were:

- 1: Planning
- 2: Recycling and energy
- 3: Traffic and road safety
- 4: Stewardship of open spaces
- 5: Better public transport
- 6: Footpaths and cycling
- 7: Supporting community groups
- 8: Play areas

We propose to focus on the most important initiatives in the time remaining to us:

• We will ensure planning applications meet all material

considerations, and conform with the neighbourhood plan, visiting applicants and their immediate neighbours.

- We will promote home energy efficiency, recycling, the elimination of single-use plastic, and community action in association with other parishes.
- We will report street defects and support residents who have experienced problems with roads and footpaths, and will advocate more public transport initiatives in our parish.
- We will lobby for safe passages for pedestrians and cyclists across the A35, and for lower, safer speed limits.
- We will work with the owners of the nature reserves to maintain access and improve their biodiversity.
- We will maintain and improve our three play areas to meet residents' requirements.
- We will support and encourage community groups seeking to improve the environment and respond to the climate emergency.
- Where possible, we will promote community resilience.

There is a limit to what we can achieve by May 2024, but we challenge the town council election candidates to come up with councillors who can successfully meet the expectations of Bothenhampton and Walditch residents for the future. *Jim Basker, BWPC Chair*

Dorset Council's community governance review, which closed at the end of October last year, received 480 responses, of which 10% came from Bradpole residents. Of these there was an overwhelming support (90%+) for the retention of Bradpole Parish Council. Flying the flag to remember American soldiers

On 17 May the United States flag will be flown from the Walditch church flagpole to remember two companies, 'E' and 'G', of the 2nd Battalion 16th Infantry Regiment, a part of the American 1st Division (The Big Red One). On this date in 1944 they left Walditch, where they had been

stationed since 6 November 1943, to prepare for the D-Day landings in Normandy, which took place on 6 June 1944. They are permanently remembered by a plaque on the south wall of the church.

The battalion moved to a holding camp near Dorchester, which was sealed from outside contact on 24 May to maintain secrecy before the plans were divulged to the troops for the first time. The battalion then started boarding USS Henrico at Portland on 31 May. 'E' company was in the first wave to land on Omaha Beach with 'G' 30 minutes later. They faced murderous fire with heavy casualties; things were not going to plan, with a real risk that the Omaha landing would be thrown off the beach. Through leadership and teamwork, however, 'G' company and a platoon of 'E' found a route to the top of the bluff behind the beach. This breakthrough saved the day and averted a potential disaster. A notice now marks the route taken, reading: 'Route du Capitaine Joe Dawson (commander of 'G' Company)'. *Robin Stapleton*

Lower Walditch Play Area & Community Orchard

It gives me great honour as chair to compile the second annual report for Lower Walditch Play Area & Community Orchard 2021-22.

Despite the ongoing challenges of living with Covid, we have been fortunate to build on the success of the first phase of the play area. This was instigated by Anne Loades, who has since retired from the committee, and we are deeply appreciative of all her hard work and tenacity in laying the foundations of this community group.

Following our successful grant application to the National Lottery Community Fund for £9,896, the Viking swing was installed in June 2021 and has become a much-loved asset to the play space.

Despite Covid-related delays we celebrated our belated birthday party in October 2021 to thank those who had helped us so far and to share the space with our community. Alongside the festivities, with lots of cake and a lovely raffle we managed to raise £186.

Our second Christmas trail, which took place in December 2021, involved 55 households and raised £165. It included a decorated window competition in which 15 households took part. This was judged by Bridport Mayor Ian Bark, who commented very positively on the community feel here on the estate.

This year has seen the beginnings of the community orchard and wellbeing area. On 12 February a team headed by Marcos and Kathy broke the ground, planted up five espalier pear trees along the entrance to the park and created a screening area of hornbeam hedging (pictured), which now marks out the wellbeing area. We still have the West Bay Car Boot grant money for the provision of seating, and development and planning are ongoing.


We have permission from the parish council to continue adding more small elements to the play area and will be working together to achieve this.

It has been a pleasure to be part of this committee and to work together, creating a sanctuary where our children can be safe, engaged and playful, and working towards providing a quiet space for all to enjoy. In such challenging times it is an absolute tonic to know there are people using their time and skills to improve our lives.

This year we have seen more movement in the committee, and have welcomed Aureen as treasurer. We have continued to work hard behind the scenes with regular meetings and are dedicated to the sustained development of the area as well as the running of the community group. This has included securing another bank account, which has been no small feat; Jan, Aureen and Charlie deserve recognition for their efforts. We are always open to welcoming members to the committee and to taking part in working parties and events planning.

From the parish editor

May, the month of blossoming trees such as horse chestnut, crabapple and the hawthorn (or may) tree. The common hawthorn, *crataegus monogyna*, is a UK native. It is worth planting in your garden, or looking out for one growing wild. This thorny tree is covered with five-petalled creamy white flowers, lasting until June and followed later by autumnal red berries. My father's mother – aptly named Mercy – as a child escaping with friends from their nanny or childminder would eat the hawthorn buds and called them 'bread and cheese' because of their nutritious content. The berries can also be used to make jam.

The difference between hawthorn and blackthorn, as described by Charlie Mellor from the Woodland Trust, is that the blackthorn produces flowers earlier, before its leaves, whereas the hawthorn flowers after its leaves have emerged. Also, hawthorn petals are rounder and fuller than the delicate blackthorn.

The full moon in May is known as the 'flower moon'. The banks and hedgerows are busy with 'Queen Anne's lace', the umbelliferous crowns of white on the green stems of the wild carrot plant. There are stories that the purple flower in the centre was Queen Anne, and the white flowers surrounding her were her lace collars. Another story tells that the flower is named after Saint Anne, the patron saint of lacemakers and the mother of the Virgin Mary. Further, the flower is apparently also known as the 'bishop's flower', a symbol of sanctuary, safety and refuge. Another visual interpretation is as a bird's nest, as when gone to seed it appears to look like one, reinforcing the symbolic idea of sanctuary and safe home.

The Bridport Tree Planting Group (BTPG), co-ordinated by Joe Hackett, has had an active season. One of the last plantings was on 13 March at St Mary's churchyard, where the pink blossom will complement the adjacent hawthorn and cherry to the west. Many saplings have been given away to be planted. The Living Tree allotment by the River Pymore has benefited, for example, and St Mary's fields put 48 saplings in the ground. West Bay playground has a host of trees and a gathering of willows at the Hyde, and there have been community plantings at Shipton Gorge and private plantings at Walditch and West Milton. I joined in planting assorted trees to contribute to a rewilding site at Hogchester nature reserve near Charmouth. More trees were planted around the golf club, at The Cowshed behind Bridport Medical Centre, and at Coneygar Hill by Millennium Green – such is the local reach.

Groves nurseries have generously supported the initiative, giving holly, pine, guelder rose, dog rose, copper beech, spindle, Corsican pine and Bhutan pine. Such an offering of trees for the future!

BTPG's little nursery at Riverside Gardens is now less full, and Joe has applied for a kit called 'Coppice in a box' from Moor Trees, a charity dedicated to restoring native

woodland on Dartmoor and nearby. The kit could enable 400 tree seeds to be grown on, and the group also hopes to learn more about seed collection and propagation to help with future planting projects.

To continue the plant theme, St Swithun's is to hold a fundraising plant sale and car boot sale on Saturday 21 May from 10am to 1pm. See the advert on p4 for more details. Volunteers are needed to help tidy up the courtyard and adopt a pot to take home and fill with plants ready for the car boot sale. Please contact Jo George if you can help. The church will be open to receive produce, tombola prizes, cakes, bric-a-brac, clothes, etc., after 2pm on Friday 20 May.

There has also been fundraising at St Swithun's for Ukraine amounting to £1,121: Caroline Cooke's coffee morning on 19 March raised £900 and the community coffee morning raised £221.

Finally, on 3 April Graham and Angie Williams created a cake bonanza with tea and raffle, raising £2,636. They are now looking for the best way to use these funds to buy an electric wheelchair and related equipment for their daughter Melissa so she can become more independent. Congratulations to all involved in these events. *Anna Sullock*

The Joliba Trust

One of the stalls at our car boot sale on 21 May will be run by Frances Jobling in aid of the Joliba Trust. This charity has been working since 1992 to reduce the effects of climate change and improve the rural livelihoods of native people in Mali, West Africa.

Land here has become depleted, in the main because of climate change. Vast amounts of fertile land have been turned to dust, and much tree cover and biodiversity of pasture land has been lost. The mainstay of the economy, raising livestock, has become almost impossible.

Joliba has become well known in Mali for its positive, encouraging work in stabilising 2,000 acres of dunes since 2013, protecting the economy of 40 villages in a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The hills are now covered with wildlife as well as with pasture for livestock; trees and crops are providing food and traditional medicine for people and their animals. Thanks to these structural changes there is less weather erosion and therefore less damage to harvests, enabling people to live well.

It costs £188 to stabilise an acre of sand dunes. For £10,

20 grafted fruit trees can be planted, producing a significant income in a short space of time. Joliba does not have ex-pat staff working in Mali but employs local people to organise and oversee the work. The physical work is done by local people, too, but on an unpaid, voluntary basis.

Frances has been supporting this successful project for eight years and has raised enough to protect seven villages. Look out for her stall at the sale, where she will be selling homemade wares including scarves suitable for an English summer plus winter scarves, cowls and handwarmers. She also has copies of reports and information about Joliba that she will be happy to share with you.

The real message of Ascension Day

On 26 May we celebrate Ascension Thursday, 40 days after Easter. One of the readings for that day puts it like this: "Now as he [Jesus] blessed them, he withdrew from them and was taken up into heaven."

The image is a difficult one to sort in our minds when it's more than 50 years since a man first walked on the surface of the moon. We probably tend to ask the wrong questions: How did Jesus go? Where did Jesus go? Christian art seems to be trying to answer those same questions, but it's not rocket science and these are not the kind of questions the bible tends to ask or answer. The bible much more often seeks to answer the question "Why?" than "How?" – why did Jesus go? The truth is that Jesus' earthly work was fulfilled and completed by his being with the Father and empowering us through the Holy Spirit. The Ascension is about Christ's completed work and our unfulfilled work.

It is worth noting that in the oldest account of the Ascension, "a cloud took him out of their sight" (Acts 1:9). In both the Old and New Testaments a cloud is not just something to do with the weather, it is a sign of the presence of the glory of the Lord. It tells us that God is decisively present. The conclusion of Jesus' earthly ministry turns out to be continuous with a long history of divine self-revelation.



The cloud recalls the moment of the Transfiguration on Mount Tabor, when the voice of the Father was heard: "This is my Son, my Beloved." It points to that moment of history when Jesus will come again "in a cloud with power and great glory."

The real message of Ascension is not that Christ has vanished beyond Earth's orbit, but that he enters the Father's glory, a glory which is set to fill the world, a glory for which each one of us is made.

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
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
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
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
