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Learning to press pause: the gift of time out

Taking time to

be still helps us

to notice and

give thanks for

the beauty of the

present moment

"Keep the Sabbath, it's holy to you... because in six days God made the heavens and the earth and on the seventh day he stopped and took a long deep breath... Keep my days of rest, for this is something special between me and you forever." Exodus 31 (The Message)

Next month I'm taking a sabbatical, a gift from the Methodist Church to its ministers every seven years.

It's based on the biblical principle of Sabbath as a time of rest that allows us to "stop and take a long deep breath" as God did. As the church puts it, a sabbatical is "a chance to do something different that will inform and perhaps re-enthuse ministers in their ministry; a time of grace allowing them to spend time with God doing something different; a time for refreshment and

renewal... to be able to hear the still small voice of God."

Businesses and organisations are increasingly offering sabbaticals to employees, but even if we don't have that opportunity, it's important to try and take time in our daily lives to press the "pause" button, to stop, look, listen, notice and enjoy being in the moment.

We live in a world of constant pressure to be on the move, planning for the next deadline or event, checking social media and messages. All this affects our ability to focus on one thing, or one person, at a time, and to resist the temptation to squeeze one more thing into our day.

In his book The Power of Pause, Terry Hershey suggests that society values people by how busy they are, so we ask and talk about how busy we are. But the danger of being so busy is that we have no "white space" in our calendars, no space that isn't filled with stuff to do, so we're always hurried and stressed.

That way of living means we have conversations where neither we nor the other person is really there, because while we're talking or in a meeting, we're also sending emails or texting rather than paying full attention.

He tells the story of a little boy who asks his mum: "Mummy, will you listen to me, but this time, will

Hershey argues that what many of us are missing in our lives is giving ourselves permission to just "be here", so we need to

learn the "wisdom of two spaces".

One space is where we get stuff done, we're active and productive, which is good. The other space, often neglected and overlooked, is where we pause: for prayer, reflection, renewal, to "be here" with God or Jesus, for poetry and friendship or even

just doing nothing.

Paying attention to that second space is really important because it allows our souls to catch up with our bodies. Taking time out to pause and be still helps us to notice and give thanks for the beauty of the present moment. The writers of the Psalms were good at that, and Jesus regularly took time out to be alone with God as part of the rhythm of his ministry.

During the Covid-19 lockdowns many people reported feeling more in touch with the rhythms of nature because the limitations on movement meant they had more time to pause and become aware of the world around them.

So maybe this summer we can all try to be fully present to each moment or each person we encounter, looking and listening attentively, and give ourselves that time of grace allowing ourselves to spend time with God doing something different, allowing ourselves a time for refreshment and renewal, a time to be able to hear the still small voice of God.

Because that's something we all need, for the good of our souls, as well as our bodies. *The Revd Jane Wilson Bridport United Church*



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This year's Christian Aid Week appeal will help people in Burundi to escape poverty

Christian Aid Week (CAW) 2024 focuses on Burundi, one of the smallest countries in Africa and the second poorest in the



world. The global cost of living crisis has intensified challenges for families there, and malnourishment and poverty now affect more than 70% of the population.

Poverty robs people of their dignity and lets injustice thrive. Aline Nibogora (pictured) was married young and had her eldest son, Fisto, when she was just 14. She experienced constant abuse from her violent husband, who then married another woman, forcing Aline to flee. He prevented her from taking their children, and cruelly told the local community that she was mentally ill and unable to care for them.

"I wandered the streets, asking anyone for a place to sleep," Aline says. "Those who showed me kindness would let me stay for two or three days, but it was difficult. People would insult me and treat me with contempt. They forgot I was a human being."

Hungry, scorned and alone, Aline took her first step towards her new life through a transformative threeday community workshop funded by Christian Aid. She learnt how to form a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) and establish a steady income. VSLAs let people save for their future and borrow money to kickstart small rural businesses. With a small start-up loan, Aline started trading avocados and peanuts locally, and in time bought a bicycle for carrying her goods. Eventually, she rented a house, allowing her three eldest sons to escape their father and join her. Today, Aline lives peacefully on her own land, where she has baked bricks and built a strong home for her family. "I am so happy that we are together," she says. "Now my children feel supported as they have a parent who can meet their needs."

You can change someone's life in Burundi with so little. Just £5 could buy a savings book to help them set up a small business; £27 could buy a lockable safe to protect a community's savings, hopes and dreams; £100 could train 10 people to support their families in starting small businesses, such as selling home-grown vegetables.

You can help in several ways, such as helping to drop off envelopes, or acting as a collection point. Or take part in this year's CAW Challenge, '70K in May' - that's just over 2km (1.5 miles) per day, running, walking, cycling, swimming however you fancy! 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All aboard the Number 7! Passenger feedback leads to improved community bus service

The Service 7 bus has been revised (from April) to include some changes taken from passenger feedback.

The warm and comfy Number 7 community bus is an around-town service linking places such as Court Orchard, Skilling and Bradpole to the town centre, hospital and shops on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

The drivers speak warmly about their passengers – "It's like driving your neighbours around!" – and passengers describe it as a lifeline. Regulars include the elderly and visually impaired, and drivers will help them on to the bus with their shopping.

The revised route for each of the two circuits starts and finishes at Morrisons rather than the bus station. The timetable and map have been adapted and printed in a larger format to make them easier to read.

There is plenty of room for more passengers, so if you'd like to see the timetable (and a larger map than shown on this page) go to *www.bridportandwestbay. co.uk/visit/map-directions* or pop into Bridport Tourist Information Centre on Bucky Doo Square for a free hard copy.

There are flat-rate fares of £2 a single journey, £1 for under-19s and free for under-7s. Concessionary passes are accepted.

Parish Green Day answers a call to action

The recent Parish Green Day brought together representatives from the six Parish of Bridport churches to explore ways to nurture and protect wildlife - around church buildings, through worship and via community engagement using A Rocha's Eco Church scheme.

"What a wonderful day!" says Janet Webster, leader of the parish's Eco Church sub-committee. "We had lively discussions, surveys to complete and discuss, excellent speakers and guests from other green organisations in Bridport.

"Eco Church encourages us to look at five areas of our lives, to assess through a survey how we're doing, then plan some simple targets to improve our custodianship of the natural world. The scheme rewards certain milestones with Bronze, Silver and Gold awards."

Gill Perrott from Beaminster Church kicked off the morning session with a presentation about the church's successful work towards the Eco Church Gold award.

Workshops for individual churches then allowed representatives to work out their current position in respect of the A Rocha scheme, and make a six-month



plan of action. Guests from other environmental groups visited at lunchtime. Alison Little from Bee Friendly Bridport (pictured left) presented two bee boxes for the churchvards at St Swithun's and St Mary's Bridport. Then the afternoon began with a clear message

from Miriam and Christopher from Wild and Messy Church: young people are the future, and everyone must work harder to make a better world.

Lesley Windsor from Sustainable Bridport gave a lively talk, and there was a presentation by David Morgan from A Rocha and the Diocese of Salisbury. Canon Deb Smith, Team Rector, closed the afternoon.

"Our six churches are now all registered for Eco Church," says Janet, "and a second Bronze award has been achieved as a result of the Green Day, too. Many thanks to all who took part in the day or helped to make it happen. Our Eco Church journey continues! Come and join us - you'll be very welcome."



A charity dedicated to improving the wellbeing and resources of the community in Bridport is looking to recruit a trustee with knowledge of building maintenance. In the last issue we brought you news of the forthcoming centenary of the eight bells in St Mary's Bridport. The ringing team and other members of the church are preparing to celebrate this important event and are launching an appeal to fund repairs and an upgrade.

In 1924, the people of Bridport arranged for the complete recasting and renewal of the bells in St Mary's. Each bell bears an

inscription commemorating one or more of the families who contributed towards the cost.

"Many of the people mentioned on the bells have descendants living in Bridport now," says Bob Hardwick, Tower Captain, "and we'd like to mark the occasion by acknowledging each family's important contribution to bellringing in the town.

"We're asking them to contact us and tell us what they know about their 1924 family, as we plan to compile a memorial book of these stories. We'll also arrange for them to see their family bell in the tower, to sound it and hear its note, and even to have a go at bell ringing if they'd like to."

The inscriptions are as follows:

Millennium Green is a wildlife haven in the town

Sometimes, building projects can have unexpected advantages. This was the case in 2000 when Churchill Retirement Living wanted to build retirement properties next to Mountfield.

Our story begins in 1786, when William Downe purchased land on the southern slope of Coneygar Hill to the north of Bridport and built himself a fine house there - Downe Hall. He was a Bridport local with fishing interests at West Bay, but was also a London merchant. It is likely that when Downe Hall was built, several trees were planted on the hill behind the house, and these include the famous Lucombe oak, a cross between a turkey oak and a cork oak first propagated by an Exeter nurseryman around 1765. Another splendid tree from the same era is the lime tree on the east side of Mountfield. By 1839 the estate included most of the land from the gardens between Rax Lane and Downe Hall all the way through Victoria Grove to Dodhams Lane. You pass through the pillars marking the southern entrance to the house and estate as you approach the woodland from Mountfield.

Alfred Dammers bought the hall in 1894 and altered and extended the house as well as establishing a new terrace garden and a woodland. The 'Ice House' by the current entrance to the wood is actually part of a bridge that carried the road up to the house.

In 1999 that new development (Alfred Lodge) gave the opportunity for the town to acquire much of the estate as part of the Millenium celebrations, and in 2000 West Dorset District Council vested the land to Bridport Millennium Green Trust. Coneygar Hill is now registered with Historic England for its Historic Landscape Importance (Grade 2) and the gardens, meadow and encircling woodland have become an invaluable asset for residents and visitors – human and otherwise!

The meadow and woodland are part of the crucial green patchwork of sites that provide a home for wildlife around Bridport and this is a marvellous place to visit and enjoy. Woodland trees include beech, ash, maple and oak, with occasional hornbeam and lime



trees on the eastern side of the hill. The mature pines are the remains of a plantation that once covered a large part of the hill's west side. More recently, we have planted several hundred native shrubs

and trees to improve the area for wildlife. Woodand flowers include ramsons (wild garlic) and bluebells, there are extensive badger setts, and occasionally roe deer are seen. Over 30 bird species have been recorded and small mammals abound in the lightly cattlegrazed grassland, while several butterfly species take advantage of the bramble and other foodplants.

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Here's the buzz about Bee Friendly Bridport's trail launch

Bee Friendly Bridport is a community group that's spreading the word about the importance of all pollinators and how habitat loss puts them at risk. It was set up last year by the team at The Dorset Bee – a group of natural beekeepers – and the Symondsbury School Bee Club.

The group launched its campaign at the Charter Fair last May and since then members have been telling individuals, groups and organisations about things they can do to support pollinators, and how these actions can have a positive effect on natural ecosystems and biodiversity. The suggestions include growing more pollinator-friendly plants, leaving areas to grow wild, cutting grass less often, leaving insect nests undisturbed and trying to reduce the use of pesticides. The group has also been giving out information about how to build bug hotels and how to complete a pollinator survey.

The culmination of all this hard work was the launch of the group's Bee Hotel Trail on 30 March this year in Bucky Doo Square. John Collingwood, the town crier, alerted the residents of Bridport to the trail and the afternoon's celebrations with the following words: "Just 10% of bees have Queens on their thrones, Exploit workers, live in hives, make honey & fly drones. The rest of the 250 species are the gentle, solitary bee, Carpenter, masons, leafcutters, to name but three. For biodiversity these creatures are the best, And the least we can do is give them somewhere to nest. There are 12 hotels in town, just for that purpose, Visit them now, and then the Buzztastic Bee Circus." The Bee Hotel Trail was sponsored by the Bredy Veterinary Centre and the bee hotels themselves were lovingly crafted by



members of the Bridport Community Shed. They are sited close to a range of businesses and community groups that have agreed to be involved, namely: 1 Red Brick Cafe; 2 Bridport Community Orchard; 3 St Mary's Church; 4 The Woodman; 5 Chapel in the Garden; 6 Bredy Veterinary Centre; 7 Bridport Community Shed; 8 Mountfield; 9 Coneygar Hill; 10 Borough Gardens; 11 St Swithun's Church; 12 The Cowshed at plot 17.

A map of the trail is available from the Tourist Information Centre, from some of the locations above, or to view or download at *www.beefriendlybridport.org*. Each hotel also has a QR code that links to the map.

Bee Friendly Bridport's aim for 2024 is to apply for an award from the Bee Friendly Trust, which recognises villages, towns and cities that have demonstrated a commitment to being more bee-friendly. Bridport would benefit from this 'Bee Friendly Town' status as it would help to focus residents' efforts to provide and protect pollinator habitats, and provide a springboard for further environmental and social projects.

Recipients of the award will be announced on World Bee Day, 20 May.

Harmony: supporting wellbeing in

Harmony has been a vital part of Bridport's wellbeing support network for almost a decade, providing group sessions and individual care for anyone who needs help with their mental health.

Harmony provides mental health support in two main ways. The daytime drop-in sessions offer a safe, social space for anyone who needs it, with optional activities such as arts and crafts, yoga, or gardening at the charity's allotment by Bridport Community Orchard. There's no referral or booking system, just a friendly welcome from Harmony volunteers, along with a hot drink and biscuits and a chance to chat and join in as much, or as little, as visitors feel like.

These sessions, which have space for up to 25 people, are held each Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10am to 1pm at Harmony, plus 11am to 1pm most Tuesdays at the allotment (weather permitting). There's also MENtal Health, a men's walking group, on Tuesday afternoons, and Pilates on Monday afternoons (these two activities are free but it's a good idea to call beforehand to check availability – details are online).

"Our drop-ins are an early intervention tactic, a way of catching emotional needs early, when people are feeling a bit wobbly," says Carrie Gamble, Harmony CEO. "We want to reduce isolation and make people feel part of a community. Loneliness is often a precursor to mental health issues – admitting 'I'm lonely' is a big step, but once someone's taken it, they've started on the path to increased self-esteem and reduced anxiety.

"We have about 100 people on our books for the drop-ins, although not everyone comes regularly. Many have established a strong social network through Harmony, which is enormously helpful in supporting wellbeing."

Safe harbour in a storm

Harmony's other regular offer is the Community Front Room (CFR), an NHS-commissioned service providing one-to-one support from qualified staff for anyone facing a mental health crisis. It runs from 2.15 to 9.45pm, Thursday to Sunday, and between 12 and 15



people visit over a typical session, although there's capacity for 19. As the testimonials on Harmony's website prove, this service is a literal lifesaver.

"CFR is for people who've reached crisis point – they need help to stay safe tonight," says Carrie. "People will sometimes come back several times in an evening to talk if they're really struggling. They get help from our qualified staff, who are from different walks of life and come to us through different routes: at the moment they include a mental health practitioner and a mental health nurse, plus two peer specialists with lived experience."

Harmony's CFR is part of a network of similar facilities in the region – the others are at Wareham, Weymouth, Shaftesbury and Bournemouth University. People often visit Harmony from outside Bridport, however – even if they live nearer one of the other CFRs – so they can be anonymous. They can also attend by video call or phone if they can't get to the centre.

A bright future

The charity is celebrating its 10th anniversary with an exciting upgrade: at the end of May it will be moving just a couple of hundred metres from its current building, the Assembly Rooms on Gundry Lane, to larger premises on St Michael's Trading Estate.

"We've outgrown this building and we need more space," says Rachel Coney, Chair of Trustees. "There's no disabled access, which we absolutely should have, and

we need a more flexible layout. The new Harmony Centre, as it'll be called, will also give us more confidential space for private oneto-one sessions, and more office space so all our staff will be able to work there, rather than at home."

Harmony has secured a grant of £365,000 over five years from the National Lottery's Reaching Communities England programme. This is funding the restructure that accompanies the move - including the appointment of a full-time operations manager and a parttime administrator last October - and help the charity to deliver foundation systems and processes. Funding also comes from the Albert **Gubay Charitable Foundation** and the Alice Ellen Cooper Dean Foundation, as well as smaller grants from Bridport Town Council and donations from local businesses and individuals.

"These are significant sums of money, and we need to give our funders confidence," says Rachel. "We're working hard to prove that



we're a mature organisation with good controls."

The Lottery money won't, however, cover the refurbishment of the building, and Harmony has launched a Crowdfunder appeal to ask the local community to help with this additional £6,000.

Want to get involved?

Harmony always needs more volunteers – people to help at the drop-in, meet and greet, make tea, chat to people while they're waiting – and currently has vacancies for paid staff, too. The paid positions include bank staff for the CFR to cover holidays and other absence. "Our CFR shifts are eight hours, but staff don't need to commit to doing the whole shift," says Carrie.

As a reward for 10 years of supporting the community's wellbeing, Harmony received the King's Award for Voluntary Service in November.

The team are anticipating an invitation to a royal garden party at

Buckingham Palace this summer as a result. "It's a huge honour – like an MBE for charities," says CEO Carrie Gamble. "One of our founders, Roz Copson, will be going to the palace, plus someone who was a visitor and became a volunteer. It's very nice to be recognised in this way."

Light!

At the end of March, as the days grew longer, as the clocks changed, as Easter dawned, the symbol of light grew in significance as St Mary's celebrated Holy Week.

As Lent drew to a close, a small group met on Maundy Thursday evening to remember the day when Jesus washed his disciples' feet and first broke bread and shared wine. We celebrated by having our feet washed and sharing Holy Communion together. On Good Friday, using a poem called I Thirst, we remembered the pain and agony of Jesus' death on the cross. The poem ends with these words:

"Give us the courage to still our feet, to lower our fists, and stay with you, where you already are, in the places where you suffer still."

To help our reflection, images of the cross were

interspersed with images of pain, suffering and light across the world today, while a selection of music was played, including songs from Lebanon.

> On Easter Eve, we were joined by the five other churches in the Parish of Bridport for fish and chips around the light of the firepit. Then, following the single lighted Paschal

(Easter) candle into the unlit church, we felt we were entering a dark tomb. Each of us lit our own candle from the Paschal candle, reminding ourselves afresh that Jesus is the light of the world, and the church became bathed in candlelight.

The service ended with the six lit Paschal candles – one for each church in the parish – being carried out of St Mary's to be taken to the churches (*pictured above*).

And so Easter Day 2024 dawned, and the more adventurous assembled on the East Pier at West Bay at 6am for the Churches Together dawn service. Back at St Mary's we held our Easter Communion service, which included adding flowers to the bare cross made from the dead trunk and branches of our church Christmas tree (*pictured left*). The service ended with us leaving the church building and meeting in the churchyard (*also pictured left*) to sing the final hymn, Thine Be the Glory – our first step this Easter in taking the good news that Jesus is alive from inside the building of St Mary's to the community outside. *Peter Wright*

• Chairman Colin Baker's closing remarks. The parish council was being dissolved after 130 years, having been founded in 1894. While councillors had determined the policy direction of the parish council, and maintenance of the civil parish, this could not have been fully implemented without the work of the valued clerks who would be transferring to Bridport Town Council, providing continuity for residents. He thanked the councillors, both past and present, as well as clerks and the volunteer community groups for their work over the years for Bradpole residents.

* The balance carried over is expected to be used within the new Bradpole Ward, but this cannot be guaranteed. Bridport Town Council has committed to maintaining the parish as before and will consider future projects. DB

Our Easter Sunday service

Although the weather on Maundy Thursday was stormy with hailstorms and torrential rain, it was dry and sunny for the Easter Sunday morning service at St Mary's Walditch. The church was beautifully decorated for Easter with various flower decorations including the representation of Jesus' tomb (pictured right).

Our organist, Thelma Pulman, gave the small congregation a strong lead as usual as she accompanied the four hymns, encouraging everyone to sing heartily. The hymns were: Now the Green Blade Riseth; Jesus Christ Is Risen Today; Alleluia! Sing to Jesus; and Thine Be the Glory, Risen, Conquering Son.

The readings were Acts 10:34–43, when the Apostle Peter reveals that the Good News of Christ is open to all regardless of race, colour or creed, and John 20:1–18:



Jesus, who was crucified, has been raised. We learn that Mary, Peter and an unnamed disciple discover Jesus' empty tomb – the outward, visible sign that He has conquered death and that a new creation has begun.

The Revd Ann Ayling gave a very moving sermon inspired by the Gospel reading and on the theme of love, which permeates the narrative and the characters involved. She quoted from a poem called Love by the mystical lyricist George Herbert (1593–1633). The poem describes a celebration of life's feast, to which one is invited but there is hesitation owing to the consciouness of sin. Love tells the guest that there is always a welcome, despite one's sins; Christ bears the blame and we are completely free to enter the feast.

Ann also mentioned a book by the now Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, called The Things He

Carried: A Journey to the Cross: Meditations for Lent and Holy Week, in which he tells the story of a mother waiting for her daughter to return from the nearby primary school. The girl is massively late, and the mother becomes very worried. Eventually the child returns, to her mother's immediate relief but great annoyance, too. The mother learns that her daughter had been delayed by a woman dropping a large, expensive vase. "Did you help her pick up the pieces then?" asks the mother. "No," replies the daughter. 

Wild and Messy Church

Wild and Messy Church continues to take place on the second Thursday of each month and March was no exception. With just two weeks until Easter, that was the theme of the occasion.

The title was Seeing is Believing and the event introduced the idea of the Risen Christ, telling the story from Mary Magdalene's point of view as a witness. After Jesus' crucifixion by the Roman authorities, Mary went with two other women to his tomb, carrying spices to anoint his body. The women were terribly sad but to their amazement they found an empty tomb and two angels, who told them Jesus was not dead but was alive again. After confusion among the disciples, there was huge joy when they realised that Jesus was still with them. Mary told of the shock of Jesus' death and finally her own joy of meeting him after his resurrection in the garden beside the tomb.

Reflecting the idea of Mary Magdalene's trust in Jesus. Annie led the children on her guitar as they sang Why Don't You Put Your Trust in Jesus? and Jesus Is Alive Today.

As always, the Wild and Messy craft activities matched our chosen theme, and we focused on making a model tomb using rather messy papier mache. Some of the children enjoyed building up the layers and were somewhat better at the activity than their adult helper! Afterwards we set the finished tomb, complete with large stone, on a display tray for the congregation of St Swithun's to enjoy over Easter.

The most colourful activity this month was the creation of fold-out Easter cards with Michele and Annie. The children helped to complete a pre-prepared card on the theme of Fruits of the Spirit, and they chose the spiritual gifts that Jesus can help them to grow: love, joy, patience, kindness, goodness, self-control. As we look forward to Pentecost this month, we reflect on the Easter just past when we at BUC were challenged by a bold change of seating arrangements. This made us look at one another and also provided



space for a very ad-lib drama, completely unrehearsed, that asked us all to imagine ourselves in the upper room on that first Easter day when all seemed quite lost. The disciples gathered together, fearing what was going to happen to them and wondering just what, to their minds, had gone so terribly wrong.

But of course, what at that moment seemed to be the end, by the conclusion of the day had become just the beginning. It was a moment when everything

May is the month of Mary

Throughout the world, the Catholic Church dedicates the month of May to Our Lady – the Blessed Virgin Mary. May is the month when vibrant new growth appears in the fields and meadows. Nature bursts into green. Blossoms abound on the trees; there's new life, too, in the young lambs gambolling in the fields. May tells us that spring is here at last, and we're leaving behind the long, cold, gloomy winter. May is also the month that heralds summer.

In times gone by, every English village had a maypole on the green (some still have) and on the first day of May the children danced around the maypole then celebrated the crowning of the May Queen. It is a pretty ceremony that we still carry out on the green here in Bridport. And in the church calendar we have the very important devotion to Mary, mother of God.

The adoption of devotion to the Virgin Mary throughout May probably began in Italy in the 17th century and by the 19th century had spread to France and then throughout the Catholic world. Many of us remember the May processions held in Catholic churches throughout the land where young girls, dressed in white and wearing white veils, processed from the church, through the grounds and around the building. We would assemble in the school hall to get ready and line up so the nuns could put on our veils. Many a scalp was scratched with the hair grips that were used to anchor these veils, and many a little girl sobbed when she saw the reflection in the mirror of a comically applied veil, tied tightly just above her eyebrows. There was nothing she could do about it, because "Sister said to leave it alone". It's funny to think of it now, but at the time it was sheer

mortification.

The priest (very often under an ornate canopy), accompanied by the altar servers and the young girls in white, led the procession

from the church out into the pleasant air of a May evening singing such hymns as O Mary We Crown Thee with Blossoms Today, Queen of the Angels and Queen of the May. By the time we had processed back into the church, the tail of the singing crocodile was usually half a verse behind the

head. At the close of the procession there would be Benediction and a child would be chosen to crown the statue of Mary with a garland of flowers.

May processions seemed to peter out after the 1960s and 70s, possibly in the wake of the Second Vatican Council. Will we see them return? *Pat McEvoy*

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
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





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
