Have your say on the future of Bridport and Symondsbury

Back in 2019, Bridport Town Council and neighbouring parishes worked together to create the Bridport Area Neighbourhood Plan (BANP) — a shared vision for how our area should grow and develop.

The BANP helps decide where new homes and businesses should go, what they should look like, and how we protect our much-loved green spaces. If you have a look at planning application decision notices, you can see the plan referenced.

Five years on, it's time to take another look and make sure the BANP still reflects what local people want for the future. Sally Freemantle, Town Clerk, explains what this means: "The Bridport Area Neighbourhood Plan has always been an important document. When the town council responds to planning applications, it's essential to have policies that are truly local and relevant to our area. A dedicated team of volunteers has reviewed the BANP, and now it's your turn to comment. Your views will help make sure we can make strong, well-informed representations to the planning authority."

You might wonder why another consultation is needed if you've already had your say on the Dorset Draft Local Plan. The BANP is different: it focuses specifically on Bridport and Symondsbury, setting out locally shaped policies that reflect our community's priorities. It's also the most up-to-date planning document that councils will use when deciding on future development.

So, have we got it right for the future of our area? Do you agree with the direction the updated plan is taking? Your feedback really matters — the strength of the Neighbourhood Plan comes from local support.


Advent courses in the Parish of Bridport

The highlight of this year for me was visiting my American cousin Lisa at her home in Connecticut.

During a chat about US/UK cultural differences, I mentioned that British people can't stand anything too earnest or wholesome. It makes us feel uncomfortable and we have to break the awkwardness with a joke. She'd mentioned little things: an encounter with a friendly dog; successfully growing herbs on the kitchen windowsill; meeting an interesting person in the supermarket queue. Things that can brighten anyone's day, if only we let them.

Inside this bumper, festive issue of The Bridge, we have a round-up of #AttitudeOfGratitude musings from people in our community – and one rather well-known person from further afield – plus interviews with two particularly creative locals and loads of news and info about Advent and Christmas happenings in and around our fabulous town.

Noticing God's blessings

This issue of The Bridge bursts with invitations to Advent and Christmas events across our vibrant town. I hope they fill you with joy and excitement.

For Christians, Christmas celebrates God's astonishing gift: Emmanuel, God-with-us, a vulnerable baby born among us

to share in the complexity of our human lives and offer his life for us.

Yet December is laden with expectation, and the gap between the promise and reality of Christmas can weigh heavily. As the baby grew inside her, Mary must have struggled with the enormity of it all. Many of us feel overwhelmed this season – perhaps by unnecessary burdens we place on ourselves or others, or by the contrast between the peace we long for and the chaos we experience.

This tension reflects what Christians call "the now and the not yet" of God's Kingdom – living in the middle of the story, not at its conclusion. We inhabit a world still marked by suffering and brokenness, yet God is among us. Through Christ, everything needed for the world's redemption and renewal has been accomplished. The Kingdom has broken in, but it isn't yet fully realised.

How can we proclaim the Good News of Jesus, when our daily newsfeed brings us anything but good news? How do we hold celebration alongside sorrow, hope alongside hardship?

One answer may lie in the spiritual practice of gratitude, a theme explored elsewhere in this magazine. Gratitude doesn't deny pain or gloss over difficulty with false cheerfulness. Instead, it actively trains us to notice God's presence and blessings around us, even amid struggle. It teaches us to see where the Kingdom is breaking through – in acts of kindness, moments of beauty, unexpected grace.

A daily gratitude diary can help us notice infinite small blessings, however difficult life is. Try noting three things each day: maybe a warm conversation, someone's kindness, a glimpse of beautiful winter sunlight. As we focus on God's gifts, we're released from the weight of our own expectations. We rediscover awe and wonder – awakening to God, who continually meets us in surprising ways. *The Revd Cally Burch, Interim Rector*

All aboard the Bridport Line as museum publishes book of railway memories

Bridport Museum has released a book to celebrate the Bridport Branch Railway, which closed 50 years ago this year.

An oral history project set out to gather memories from people who used the line and knew of its quirks. In the end, about 40 people were interviewed, and their stories are published at the end of November in a new book, Railway Memories: All Aboard The Bridport Line.

The memories were edited by Tegwyn Jones, a volunteer at the museum, who also drew on stories in local history books and museum archives. "It's been a

fascinating exercise, which would not have happened without the willing participation of a lot of people," he says. "The conversations threw up a lot of great stories that will go into museum archives for future researchers; there was a lot more material than we could get into the book.

"Last year, the museum published a book on Quirky Bridport that proved so popular we had to print two more editions. Encouraged by this, I felt a book on the human aspect of the railway might be really interesting for locals and visitors – and its sales will provide some useful income for the museum."

Museum manager Michelle Caesar says: "The museum has run several initiatives during this anniversary year to engage with local people and visitors about the Bridport Branch railway. The exhibition we are running in the museum at the moment has been popular, and this book is part of that effort. Its publication comes at an ideal time to make it a welcome Christmas gift. It's a great way to support the museum and find out more about the railway's fascinating history."

Railway Memories is £7.90 and for now is only available from the shop at Bridport Museum in South Street plus Toller Post Office and the Marquis of Lorne at Nettlecombe. Museum staff hope that other shops in the town will stock it in the new year.

It's quite unusual to interview an author on the very spot where the story begins. Yes, that's exactly what happened when I met Rosanna Ley to talk about her latest book, The Italian Flame. Backtrack to 1965 and the opening sentence is: It was a warm, sunny day in July and Marilyn was sketching on Burton Beach. And so begins a blissful read, set in dual time, that takes the reader from Dorset to Italy.

Rosanna has lived in West Bay for over a decade. Although her roots are in Sussex, she came to know her adopted county through family holidays, developing a fondness that has endured. "I remember house hunting, looking at the coast and

villages around Bridport," she says. "With my husband, we drove up the hill, towards what we now know as The Seaside Boarding House. I had such a strong feeling; an immediate connection and a knowing that I wanted to write about this place." And she did – creating a perfect blend of fiction and factual location placement.

Her genre is best defined as emotional drama. Romantic elements intertwine, in this case, with a multi-generational story that lends to a myriad of viewpoints within the plot. Without revealing the twists and turns, Rosanna explains: "I'm fascinated by the ITV series Long Lost Family,

sometimes saddened by the complexities of family life, then I wonder about the consequences." As time passes, events and evidence fade in memory or go to the grave. The story shows it's worth a try, but Rosanna has barely got the reader to Italy before a caffè owner says: You must understand this... Not every person who has been adopted wants to be found. The inner need to know your tribe, to have that sense of belonging and

completion, underpins
The Italian Flame. "It's

be unresolved grief, an
absolute delight, or
end with the possibility
of rejection."

Rosanna's books are a heady mix of culture, landscapes, mystery and

relationships all meticulously researched. "I visit the places, walk the paths my characters will follow, and check that it all rings true. I double-check distances and cafe menus!" This not only gives the reader a deep feeling of authenticity, it also adds to the many reasons why page turning is so beneficial. For example, Rosanna refers to the Bay of Poets - also known as the Gulf of La Spezia, located between the towns of Porto Venere and Lerici. Having kindled curiosity, one step leads to another. A quick internet search reveals that Byron, DH Lawrence, Shelley and his wife Mary all had links with the

area, and this is deftly woven into the text. In Rosanna's book, lead character Lily, when visiting a villa on the Mediterranean waterfront, reflects: They were so young, only in their twenties, when they arrived in 1822. The text continues: She read about Shelley's sense of enchantment and amazement, his desire to heal the wounds of his soul through the crystalline waters and clear skies of the bay.

It sounds glamorous to be an author. In reality, it's tough — particularly to sustain it — and Rosanna was keen to talk about other aspects of her career. She has worked with community groups in therapeutic settings and completed an MA in creative writing for personal development in order to support this. She has also mentored and appraised the work of new writers. Rosanna has worked as a creative writing tutor for over 30 years, has led courses for colleges

Based near the town of Cómpeta, writing holidays take place at the stunning location of Finca el Cerrillo, a 200-year-old farmhouse close to the traditional Andalucían village of Canillas de Albaida, high in the foothills of the Sierra de Almijara, southern Spain. The finca was a working olive mill until the mid-1960s and has been carefully restored to preserve the charm and character of old Andalucía while providing the modern comforts and excellent cuisine of a small and charming hotel.

Whether it's been a while since books were your best friend, or you're searching for a Christmas gift or a story to cosy up with over the festive season, it's worth taking a look at the Reading Agency website. A charity registered in England and Wales, the agency has lots of ideas for past and present titles, promotes the benefits of reading and how it boosts wellbeing on many levels. Rosanna's novels tick a lot of boxes and she currently shows no sign of retiring her pen. So far, there are 12 published by Quercus and as many more under pseudonyms.

Could you be missing out on Pension Credit?

Dorset Council is urging residents over state pension age to check if they are eligible for financial support that could mean being \pounds_{75} a week better off.

Pension Credit is a government benefit designed to help people aged 66+ on a low income. As well as up to £75 a week it can also unlock access to additional support such as the winter fuel payment, a reduction in council tax, housing benefit (for renters), support for mortgage interest (for

homeowners), a free TV licence (for those aged 75+) and help with NHS costs.

It is separate from the state pension, so you could still be entitled to Pension Credit even if you have

other income, savings or own your own home, if you fall within the criteria.

Check whether you are eligible at www.gov.uk/pension-credit or call the Pension Credit claim line on o800 99 1234. You can also contact Citizens Advice or Age UK on the free Dorset Adviceline on o800 144 8848.



Capturing Bridport's gems with skill: illustrator Terry Whitworth

We caught up with Terry to find out about his life, career and inspirations...


The Bridge: Terry, thank you so much for letting us use your image of a wintry Mountfield. What medium did you use to create it?

Terry Whitworth: I sketched this one on my iPad using the ProCreate app. I use this for some of my work these days. At the beginning of my career there were no computers; sketching was 'analogue' and design was craft-based work with magic markers, paste-up and large drawing boards. It all started to change in the 90s with computer-aided design, and now we have tablets – it's the same technique and thought process but with electronic pens.

TB: So you've kept up with advances in technology? It's a fast-moving field.

TW: I've learnt what I've needed to learn to keep up with the changes. My wife, Lenschen, is more techminded than I am and she has been invaluable in so many aspects of our business. I still love to paint with traditional media, of course, but the iPad is so convenient sometimes.

* TB: You're well known for your 'Saturday Sketchbook' on Facebook, where you post images of local sights. Do you have any favourites among Bridport's many buildings?



TW: I love the 17th-century Beach & Company chemists opposite the Town Hall – it's now the Cancer Research shop. I also really like the Beach & Barnicott, just round the corner in South Street. There are so many fascinating buildings in the town that it's hard to choose; Bridport is full of hidden gems – many are not dramatic but are definitely worth looking at more closely and learning about.

TB: How long have you lived in Bridport?

TW: I was born and brought up in the Woking area and later moved to East Molesey, near Kingston. I trained at Twickenham Art College, where I met my first wife, and after having our two sons we decided to move somewhere more rural. I'd visited Dorset in my teens and knew it was a lovely county. We looked for the right house and found it in Bradpole.

My first marriage ended after eight years and I met Lenschen. We've been together for 30 years now. She used to be a milliner and she's very creative. We moved to North Mills nine years ago. *TB*: Yours is a creative household! Tell us a bit about your career. How did you get started in the art world?

TW: I had a bit of a false start! I went to an academic boys' grammar school where the creative arts were discouraged, and I started my working life in business with Plessey Radar. But I knew deep down I had to get into art and design. In my early 20s I went to college to study art, design and illustration. It was the right course of action and it opened up all sorts of possibilities for me.

TB: It must have been a huge relief to be doing something you loved. Where did you go from there?

TW: After college I worked in two or three design studios in London, then went freelance after moving down here. I continued to get the same sort of work - a mix of graphic design and illustration but as time went on I got more and more illustration work, which I prefer. The publisher Salmon produced lots of greetings cards and calendars of my designs, which led to lots of good illustration jobs. I got a lot of work from the building sector, for estate agents and architects, creating 'artist's impressions', bringing things to life.

TB: Have you had any high-profile clients?

TW: Well in 2008/9 I illustrated some of the design proposals for the grounds at Dumfries House for the then Prince of Wales, now the King. Before that I'd been commissioned to paint a watercolour of The Prince

of Wales School in Poundbury. I got to meet him at the presentation ceremony, and we had a chat. Of course he's a pretty good painter himself!

TB: Which other artists do you find inspiring?

TW: I particularly enjoy the work of other contemporary illustrators such as David Gentleman, who has a wonderful technique, and Hugh Casson, and I like David Hockney too. My own style of work might subconsciously include elements of other illustrators' techniques. Illustration has always been more interesting to me than fine art. I love the sketching process, the sponteneity of it.

TB: How do you feel about the rise of artificial intelligence (AI) and its ability to create art?

TW: It worries me a bit. It's amazing what it can do, and it will obviously do good in many different fields, but in creative fields I can see that it can cause a lot of problems. We'll have to wait and see.

The act, the process of creating art – the looking, seeing and studying – is to my mind more important than always having to get a good result. I think the process of drawing is innate in everyone – we'd all like to do it, and I'd like it to be regarded like reading, something we can all do and learn from. I've taught drawing to adults in art groups and it's astonishing how many say they were told at school that they weren't good enough.

TB: What do you enjoy besides art?

He was only 16 at the time but was a great guitarist even then.

O Christmas Tree!

This carol was originally a 16th-century Silesian folk song from Germany called O Tannenbaum. In 1824, German composer and lyricist Ernst Anschütz wrote new lyrics and added two verses of his own, and the English translation of his composition has become very popular.

Few carols capture the spirit of Christmas quite like this one, which has become a universal symbol of holiday cheer. Its gentle melody and heartfelt lyrics celebrate the beauty of the evergreen tree as a timeless emblem of faith, hope, and renewal. The carol has been translated into numerous languages and embraced by cultures worldwide.

We all now associate Christmas with a beautifully decorated evergreen tree. My father would cycle to Bridport on Christmas Eve to get a Christmas tree, which he would bring home and put in the box window sill, where it would stay until 6 January creating much joy in our household.

Our village church always had a Christmas tree in its chancel, and on Christmas morning after Sunday school, the children would receive prizes. There would be bags of sweets hanging from the Christmas tree; we'd all line up and the vicar would hand them out to us.

The lyrics of the opening verse are:
O Christmas tree! O Christmas tree!
Thy leaves are so unchanging;
O Christmas tree! O Christmas tree!
Thy leaves are so unchanging.
Not only green when summer's here,
But also when 'tis cold and drear.

Light the spire

A part of our traditional Christmas

Even though the British had used evergreen flora for interior decoration during the Christmas season for many centuries, decorating a fir tree for the festive period was actually a 19th-century innovation from Germany. It caught on and became a central part of Christmas celebrations to this day.

The decorated fir tree was first introduced to royal and court circles by Queen Victoria's German mother, Princess Victoria of Saxe-Coburg-Saalfeld. It was Queen Victoria herself, however, and her German husband, Prince Albert, who popularised the tree's use across the wider population.

In 1848 Albert sent decorated Christmas trees to schools and army barracks in Windsor and the surrounding countryside. This was probably part of his ongoing attempt to restore the monarchy's reputation among the people following the Regency of George, Prince of Wales (1811–20) and his subsequent reign as George IV. George's personal conduct caused the monarchy to fall into some degree of disrepute, and Prince Albert was determined to reverse this by

appealing to the growing middle classes and thwarting nascent republicanism.

A much-publicised engraving of 1848, featuring the

royal couple and their children decorating a tree with lighted candles and gingerbread men, established the Christmas tree as a major component of middle-class seasonal celebrations.

Your ward clerk writes...

Dorset Council Highways have told us that work on the Hollow Way pavement is provisionally scheduled to begin after Christmas, with completion expected in early 2026. The works will include vegetation clearance and essential repairs to the supporting wall, improving safety and accessibility. The road and footpath will need to be closed for the repairs, but disruption to the surrounding area will be kept to a minimum. Once the application has been submitted, confirmed dates will be shared with the public and stakeholders.

The footpath has been closed for over a year, but its safety has been an issue of concern for many decades. The article 'Bothenhampton & Walditch Parish Council – a history, of sorts' (available by following a link from <code>www.bridport-tc.gov.uk/wards/bothenhampton-walditch-ward</code>) notes for example that in May 1895 the parish council was concerned over the state of the Hollow Way high pavement, and the parish council clerk asked Highways for some protection to be erected along the raised causeway leading from the railway bridge (then at the bottom of Hollow Way) to Bothenhampton Church. The clerk stressed that the parish council was not asking for "the protection of

intoxicated persons" or "for tessellated pavement" but simply wanted something to be done to render the footpath safe.

According to the local paper, at the meeting of the wider council to discuss this request, the reference to intoxicated persons provoked laughter. The county council returned the matter to the parish council, giving its sanction to the latter to do whatever it considered necessary – at its own cost, naturally. In 1922, the local paper reported that the high pavement was the scene of "yet another accident" when Mr T Thorne fell onto the roadway, and in 1941 the pavement became dangerous owing to the slippage of earth. Clearly, the state of the Hollow Way pavement has been and continues to be an ongoing concern!

Remembrance Sunday

On a blustery Sunday 9 November, the Revd John Rees conducted the Act of Remembrance in our churchyard (pictured above right) for those who have died in wars. John read out the names of the soldiers from Bradpole who died in both world wars. The ceremony included the first part of the Kohima Epitaph, written by John Maxwell Edmonds in memory of those who died at Kohima in India during World War II: "When you go home, tell them of us and say: For your tomorrow, we gave our today."

Round and about the Bay

Half term saw a very busy Discovery Centre with lots of families visiting and taking part in the Find the Spider competition. The prize for finding the 10 strategically placed spiders was a spooky sticker. There was also leaf rubbing, Halloween colouring and autumn crafts. At the beginning of November the centre reverted to winter hours, opening only at weekends. It hopes to be open over the Christmas period as long as there are enough volunteers. The centre will be closed in January until the February half term, although work will be going on in the background for upcoming exhibitions. There will be talks, too, so check Facebook or the website (www.westbaydiscoverycentre.org.uk) for details.

There's no sign yet of the EV charging points working in the car park; I am sure they will be up and running soon. The car boot closed at the end of October, although it was only the truly hardy ones that kept it going after the summer. It will reopen in April. I see that some of the wooden posts are being replaced in the children's playground. The repairs to the harbour wall

are once again delayed, with a possible start date in January. I don't know if you have seen the current state of the pavement area outside the kiosks, but it looks decidedly dodgy! Work went on elsewhere throughout November, with the removal of existing chains in the East Basin to inspect, service and make repairs, plus the next phase of replacing the timber pilings.

I knew that it was busy for the West Bay Days Bonfire by the Beach, as looking out from my bedroom window I saw absolute chaos reigning. This was obviously because all the car parks were full – so where did everyone try to park? Yes, Meadowlands. The problem is that irresponsible parking upsets residents – and rightly so – and any emergency vehicles would have been held up trying to get through. Speed in an emergency is critical. The actual event, though, seemed to go off smoothly and once again the firework display was impressive.

Rise restaurant, over the bridge in the harbour, is hard to miss, but how many of you know that originally it was a cafe and post office? The Watson family took over the lease in 1960. The post office was well used and locals would stay for a cup of tea, a debate or game of dominoes. In 1964 Arthur and Jan Watson started serving basic food and sometimes local fisherman would in bring their catch for sale. Flooding became an issue and after the disastrous flood in 1976 permission was granted for the building to be raised. It rapidly became a very successful fish restaurant and often on a Saturday lunchtime private helicopters would land in the field close by, bringing celebrities for lunch. In 2018 new owners transformed it into Rise, with tables inside and out, plus comfy sofas around a log burner for a cozy winter spot.

God is with us as we face uncertainty

The angel said... "For nothing is impossible with God." "I am the Lord's servant," Mary answered. "May it be to me as you have said." Luke 1:37–38

Someone once said: "We live in uncertain times and we're moving into uncertain territory," and as we approach the end of 2025 and the beginning of 2026 that's probably as true as it's ever been, given the combination of climate change, an ever-changing political landscape, ongoing international conflicts and the consequential refugee crises.

Sometimes we face uncertainty and change closer to home, too: becoming parents, grandparents or empty nesters; being widowed; starting a new job,

school or course; retiring from paid work;

facing a diagnosis or treatment. Dealing with these situations often means we need to adjust our previous normal pattern of living. The amazing story of the unfolding events heralding the arrival of Jesus, God's Son and promised Messiah, which we celebrate at Christmas, can offer us comfort, courage, hope and inspiration when we consider how those who were part of that story faced enormous uncertainty and changes to their usual way of life.

Gabriel's message about God's plan for Mary (and Joseph) would mean not only stepping out into the unknown territory of parenthood, but also risking social ostracisation, ridicule and rejection. They could have resisted God's unexpected call on their lives, but faith in the God who makes the impossible possible allowed them to embrace his plan for their lives and trust him to reveal what the outcome of those plans would be.

But Luke's account of Jesus' nativity makes clear that the path ahead wasn't going to be easy: birth in an animal shed, strange visitors with puzzling tales of angels and a star, an outpouring of praise from an aged Temple prophet, and escaping to a strange land as a refugee escaping from the threat of death.

I imagine Mary and Joseph must have wondered what the future held as they cradled the tiny child in their arms on that first Christmas night.

And yet they, and the many other people whose lives Jesus has touched through the centuries, have found deep comfort from the truth that God is With Us in Jesus our Emmanuel, in our world and in our lives, and has promised to be with us always to the end of time.

So however uncertain our lives and our world may feel, and whatever the future may bring, we know that God is with us, that he is in control, that in Jesus he goes ahead of us to prepare the way for us, because he loves us more than we can imagine.

My prayer this Christmas and in the year ahead, is that we can all celebrate the wonder of God's love for us and say with Mary: "My heart praises the Lord; my soul is glad because of God my Saviour, for he has remembered me, and cares for me, his humble servant! From now on, all people will say God has blessed me." (Luke 1:46-49)

May you be filled afresh with the love of God, the peace of Christ, and the comforting presence of the Holy Spirit this Christmas and always.

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
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
