# Reflecting on Bridport town centre's 2025 'health check'



**Every two years, we at Bridport Town Council take a moment to pause and look closely at the health of the town centre – not just the shops and services, but the life that flows through its streets, too.**

Armed with clickers, a small team of volunteers lurk on street corners over four days between July and October to count passersby in key locations around town. We document every shopfront, categorising businesses; sometimes a tricky task when a single store sells everything from tubs of Haribo to surfboards. We send out a shopper's survey and a retailer's questionnaire. The data provides a snapshot of what is working and what needs attention.

The 2025 Health Check offers a picture that is both reassuring and challenging, and it invites us, as a community, to think about the kind of town we want to nurture. By regularly tracking these key indicators, we build a compelling case for securing much-needed funding, which requires clear evidence of local needs; the health check plays a crucial role in planning decisions as it helps us make informed choices about local priorities.

One of the most encouraging findings is stability. The number of shops in the town centre has held firm at 211, and the number of empty premises is unchanged from 2023. Most retail categories have stayed the same, and nine have even grown. Only a handful have declined, though the loss of a high street bank and the continued absence of a greengrocer and fishmonger are felt keenly.

A heartening change is in how people feel about the town. In 2023, more than half of respondents felt Bridport was getting worse; this year, that figure has dropped to 30%. Nearly half of shoppers now rate the town centre as "excellent," and a growing number believe things are improving. Footfall has risen sharply,

up 17.5% from 2023. More people are coming into Bridport, and that is no small thing.

## Persistent challenges

Of course, the survey also highlights familiar concerns. Parking remains expensive and sometimes elusive, pavements are uneven, and public transport is limited. Empty shops and poorly maintained premises affect how the town feels. These issues matter because they shape the everyday experience of residents, visitors and businesses alike.

Most retailers expect trading to remain steady rather than improve, and feel the serious challenges are parking, high rent and costs, seasonal reliance on tourism, and empty shops. While several traders are adapting through online expansion and diversification, others are considering closure or retirement due to mounting pressures. Opportunities lie in better promotion, infrastructure improvements and collaborative support to sustain Bridport's unique independent character.

Bridport's story is part of a much bigger national picture. Across the country, high streets are changing. Traditional retail is no longer the sole anchor of town life, and high streets offer leisure, hospitality, green spaces and public services. Many towns are finding new life by repurposing empty units for cafes, community services and flexible workspaces.

A town centre is more than its buildings. It is the people who walk its streets, run its businesses and gather in its cafes. It is the conversations, the markets, the events, the familiar faces. The Health Check is firmly rooted in local experience and reminds us that Bridport is resilient – but also that it needs attention, imagination and shared commitment.

Tradition has it that Valentine was a Christian priest who was martyred for marrying Roman soldiers in contravention of the Emperor's decree that they should remain single, and he became associated with the celebration of love and affection.

Plenty has been written about love, including these words from five- and six-year-olds explaining their understanding of it:

"Love is when you go out to eat and give somebody most of your chips, without making them give you any of theirs."

"When you love somebody, your eyelashes go up and down and little stars come out of you."

And a personal favourite: "When someone loves you, the way they say your name is different. You know that your name is safe in their mouth."

Love is an amazing gift, but sometimes it can be hard work in terms of the energy & commitment it takes.

As someone once said, "There will come a time in every relationship when we are called to love not *because of*, but *in spite of*. Love has at its heart not just the *feeling* of love but the *will* to love. Unless we hold on to that, it is impossible for love to last."

Perhaps that's what St Paul meant when he said, "Love is patient and kind, doesn't hold grudges, or insist on its own way." This is often quoted at weddings, but was written with the wider purpose of reminding us that love is what lies at the heart of who God is.

**Churches Together in Bridport & District are again inviting everyone to come along to various churches in the town for a simple lunch on Fridays during Lent.**

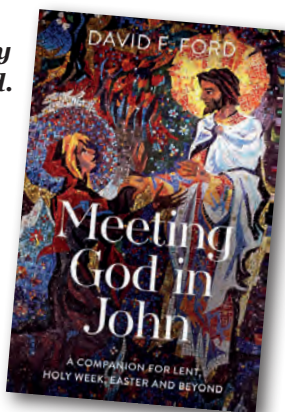

**The brand new Bridport Seed Library will open on 7 February in the lending library on South Street, bringing the first Bridport Seed Week to an exciting conclusion.**

The seed library will offer more than 100 varieties of vegetable and flower seeds – absolutely free to everyone. The seeds have been donated and packaged by several local seed savers, and will be available all year whenever the main library is open.

The project's instigator, Steve Meek, explains: "The aim is to encourage more people to grow their own vegetables, herbs and flowers, encouraging greater diversity and making locally adapted varieties freely available. This will help strengthen our local food system and our growing community. It's also a source of fun for both adults and children."

The project is run by a group of 10 volunteers, who say they would be delighted if people could learn to save seed and return it to the library, although this is not essential. Advice and help will be available from members throughout the year.

The Bridport Seed Library is a project of West Dorset Commons, which aims to create and support shared and community-owned resources. It opens at 11am on Saturday 7 February, and seed-inspired children's activities are planned for the occasion, too.

# Home-Start Wessex among winners at the 2026 Bridport Business Awards

**Home-Start Wessex was one of three winners of the Best Place to Work title at the Bridport Business Awards 2026. The winners were crowned at a special awards ceremony attended by over 60 local business representatives.**

The awards, organised by Marketing West, recognise local businesses that have significantly contributed to the local economy. Other awards included Independent Business (Baboo Gelato and Mercato Italiano), Customer Service (Smith & Smith and Sunny Days Nursery) and Hospitality (Rubicon Kitchen and The Stableyard Restaurant).

The Best Place to Work Award recognises organisations that have created an outstanding workplace based on values that have fostered a committed, effective and motivated workforce. The other two winners were ASCape, a charity that provides supportive socialisation for children and young people on the autism spectrum, and Head Sheerin' barbers.

Home-Start Wessex offers friendship, practical support and emotional advice to parents in Dorset who have at least one child under five and are in crisis. The charity provides specialist groups and home visits and

over the last year has helped a record 526 families, transforming 1,716 lives.

Supported families struggle for a wide variety of reasons, including poor mental health, postnatal depression, disability, domestic abuse, bereavement, isolation, financial hardship and multiple births.

Judges commended Home-Start Wessex for the results of its recent internal survey, which showed that staff and volunteers were 100% behind the organisation and its work to help local families in need.

The charity is actively recruiting kind, compassionate volunteers to offer emotional and practical support to parents with young children in Bridport and beyond. ## Bridport Food Matters receives National Lottery grant

**The National Lottery Community Fund has awarded local food group Bridport Food Matters (BFM) an 18-month grant to deliver its latest project, Extending Community Engagement, which focuses on developing a local, sustainable and resilient food system.**

Building on four years of networking and awareness raising, BFM will expand community collaborations, strengthen its online network, and lay the groundwork for a future physical hub.

The funding will enable closer partnerships with local food-related groups including Bridport Youth and Community Centre, Family Hub, Harmony Mental Health, Community Food Stall and Friendly Food Club.



Together they will host more regular events celebrating the growing, cooking and sharing of nutritious, sustainable food.

"Food has always been at the heart of our community life in Bridport," says BFM founder Candida Dunford Wood. "This funding helps us take that further, creating opportunities for everyone to get involved, contribute, and feel nourished in every sense of the word."

Looking ahead, BFM plans to establish the Nourish Cafe, a permanent community space and hub for events, learning and food sharing. The cafe will welcome all members of the community, with a focus on supporting people experiencing food insecurity, while also providing a shared space for other food and climate initiatives.

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# Homes for Heroes: the development of Bridport's own 'garden suburb'

**At the end of World War 1 there was a severe housing shortage.**

Prime Minister David Lloyd George launched the Homes for Heroes initiative to construct inexpensive council homes for returning service members, prompting Bridport Town Council (BTC) to launch a house-building programme financed by the 1919 Housing Act subsidies.

BTC bought land that had been part of Skilling Farm, on the slopes of Skilling Hill – which at the time was outside the council's boundaries – and proposed building 60 to 70 houses on the site, although the government would require 278 from BTC overall.

The council commissioned architect Barry Parker, who was best known for his collaboration with Raymond Unwin (his half-cousin) and their significant contributions to the Garden City projects of the early 20th century including Letchworth and Hampstead. The main idea behind this movement was to enable the occupiers of these houses to

lead more fulfilling lives, in turn improving society itself. They followed two main principles in house design: first, that houses for all classes must be designed for quality; and second, they must encourage healthy lives.

When Parker and Unwin dissolved their partnership in 1914, Parker began working on town

planning projects. He insisted on complete control over the planning, design and building of this 'garden suburb' in Bridport. In order to allow residents to walk to the mills where they worked, he decided to limit the size of the community. He took great pleasure in creating homes with spacious gardens, allowing families to grow their own food and providing space for the children to play.

The houses at the northern end of Alexandra Road were the first to be built (1920–23), with houses in Queens Road next (1923–27). Unfortunately, because of delays, promised funds were not forthcoming, and the Housing Subsidy Act expired before all of the dwellings could be completed. The Ministry of Health refused to pay →

towards a gas main and to permit use of septic tanks for drainage.

When the first occupants moved in in 1923, the homes lacked heating, cooking facilities and hot water. A few private residences had been built along Coronation Road by the middle of the 1930s. Many interlocking estates and the addition of semi-detached, detached and flats between the 1950s and 1990s expanded the development.

Marilyn Sealy, who now lives in West Bay, recounts her time living in one of the properties in Alexandra Road. "We were lucky to have a three-bedroom house," she says. "I remember my mum and brother-in-law planting a hedge on the property – a hedge which is still there today. We all had to help cut it with shears. There were fields nearby with cattle and where the shop is now was once an abattoir. It was a lovely place to live, everyone knew each other."

Skilling's role in the development of Homes for Heroes, and its connection to Barry Parker – one of the most well-known Arts and Crafts architects of the early 20th century – is significant. It also serves as an example of how the

'garden suburb' concept continued well into the 20th century.

After appearing in *Broadchurch* – written by Chris Chibnall, who still lives in Bridport – Pauline settled in West Bay for a few years with her husband, Steve. She loved it and thought Dorset a magical place.

I knew Pauline years ago as I taught her son Charlie at Davenies Prep School in Beaconsfield, Buckinghamshire. I was his form teacher and English teacher, and he appeared in my play *Rhyme and Reason*, based on Norton Juster's novel *The Phantom Tollbooth*.

Charlie was a lively, fun student with a big heart, so I wasn't surprised to see him on TV recently supporting his mum with a walk to raise money for Alzheimer's Research UK.

There was never any 'side' to Pauline; she was friendly and straightforward. Occasionally I would meet her in Waitrose doing the shopping and she would always stop for a chat. I recall one occasion when she was starring in *Emmerdale* and I asked her as a joke whether Amos Brearly was still in the Woolpack. "Bloody hell, David," she replied, "he left years ago!" And we both fell about laughing.

We kept in touch over the years and Pauline and Charlie both came over to be judges at our school talent show when I was headmaster at St James Senior Boys' School in Ashford, Surrey. Pauline could hardly believe it on the second occasion when

her fellow judge was legendary singer and rock god Robert Plant (whose grandson I also taught), lead singer of Led Zeppelin.

Here at St Mary's we welcomed well over 1,000 people to the church during the month – people of many different ages, nationalities and languages entering this 800-year-old building for many different reasons. The small core of 20 to 30 regular worshippers came as they have throughout the year to meet together, to sing, to pray, to worship and to remember that first Christmas when God's son came to be born in the poverty of a stable in Bethlehem. Others came because that is what they do at Christmas – sing the well-known carols and be touched afresh by the enormity and yet simplicity of Emmanuel, God with us. Others came because it was raining and the open door and quiet space gave them an opportunity for peace and prayer in a busy month.

This year children from the local primary schools came to engage in the Christmas Experience – a retelling and reliving of the Christmas story through engaging in different 'stations', starting in their schools, then walking to Bethlehem recreated in St Mary's. Their journey finished with them writing on paper angels the message: "To..... Peace be with you this Christmas. From.....". The children then either took the angels home to hang on their Christmas tree, or put them on the St Mary's tree to join stars that had been made in memory of loved ones by members of Lifeline, the parish bereavement group.

The two concerts held in December drew large audiences. The Ridgeway Singers and Band entertained us with their mix of Dorset tales, poems and songs with plenty of Thomas Hardy added in. This was appropriate

for St Mary's, as Thomas Hardy – then an apprentice architect from Dorchester – was involved in the reordering of the church in the 1860s.

In contrast, chamber choir Cantamus filled the church with exquisite choral singing from across the ages. How good it was to see this town-centre historic space filled with music to lift the soul!

The visitors' book chronicles the range of people who drop into the church during the week, some seeking long-lost relatives, some remembering an earlier age when they sang in the choir or attended Sunday School, and others welcoming the space for quiet meditation and prayer.

Now that February is here, the illuminated crib – which was clearly visible from the path outside and drew people in – has been packed away for another year and the Christmas tree (*pictured above*) with its many homemade stars and angels has gone. However, the good news of Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us, is as fresh and true as in those busy December days. So, if you are passing St Mary's, do call in. You will be most welcome. *Peter Wright*

It was Queen Elizabeth I that gave Bridport a new ➔

charter in the 16th century and allowed the town to hold twice-weekly markets as well as three annual fairs. The market is now renowned.

If you would like to have a stall on the market and have not applied before, you will need to complete an application form. There's more information on the town council's website ([www.bridport-tc.gov.uk](http://www.bridport-tc.gov.uk)) or you can pop into the Tourist Information Centre where staff will be able to help you.

Bridport's long, wide pavements, which are perfect for hosting the market stalls, used to be a drying place for ropes. In the early 13th century, Bridport (originally known as Bridian) was already famous for its rope making. The land was perfect for growing hemp and flax, so rope making was a natural progression. Rope makers worked day and night to produce the rope needed for King John's navy in 1213, and later Henry VIII valued the rope so much that he ordered all hemp grown within five miles of the town to be reserved for making rope for his navy. Hemp growing in Bridport eventually died out in the 19th century as there were cheaper imports on offer.

### Foods for thought this Lent

This year the liturgical period of Lent lasts from 18 February (Ash Wednesday) to 2 April (Maundy Thursday). Worldwide, many Christians use this 40-day period for spiritual study, reading Lent-themed publications and/or fasting, and in the UK many people eat pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, even if they don't know the connection between this tradition and the church calendar. So what Lenten delicacies do Christians around the world eat?

Capirotada (*pictured*), which is similar to a bread pudding, is a treat served in Mexico on Fridays during Lent. Though recipes vary from one family to the next, the traditional sweet and savory ingredients carry rich religious symbolism linked to Jesus' crucifixion. The bread represents the body of Christ, while piloncillo syrup, made from cane sugar, symbolises the blood of Christ, whole cloves represent the nails of the crucifixion, cinnamon sticks symbolise the wooden cross, and the melted cheese coating the pudding represents the shroud used for Jesus' burial.

In Ecuador, fanesca, a soup eaten during Lent and Holy Week, is made with cod and 12 kinds of beans and legumes to represent Christ and the 12 apostles at the Last Supper.

## Thelma's hymn notes

### Forty Days and Forty Nights

I have chosen this Lenten hymn because at Loders Village Primary School, where I was once a pupil, every Ash Wednesday the whole school would walk to St Mary Magdalene Church in the village for a Lent service, at which this hymn would be sung.

The hymn was written in 1856 by the Revd George Hunt Smyttan (1822–70). He was the son of an eminent Edinburgh surgeon, who helped run the medical missionary society in India.

After graduating from Cambridge in 1845, George was ordained priest and eventually became Rector of Hawkestone, Nottinghamshire, in 1850. He wrote other hymns such as *Jesu, Ever Present With Thy Church Below*, and poetry, some of which was published, including *Mission Songs and Ballads*. Sadly he died at a relatively young age in Frankfurt, Germany, while travelling alone.

The hymn promotes a message of steadfastness through obedience, spiritual growth during prayerfulness, and perseverance in one's faithfulness as a Christian despite life's trials.

The well-known German tune is by Martin Herbst (1654–81) and its name means 'out of the deep'.

The Maltese kwareżimal – whose name comes from the Latin 'Quadragesima', meaning 'the 40 days of Lent' – are sweet cakes made with almond paste, honey and orange rind. This sweet treat is also given to children who want to embark on a day-long, 14-church pilgrimage to remember Jesus' 14 Stations of the Cross.

Zenkoul is a Lebanese dish of balls made from bulgur wheat or pumpkin with chickpeas, rice, garlic, onion →

and pomegranate molasses, and is enjoyed during Lent and on Good Friday. Some families add vinegar to their recipe instead of lemon juice to remind them of when Jesus told the Roman soldiers "I thirst" (John 19:28) before dying on the cross and fulfilling the prophecy "for my thirst they gave me vinegar." (Psalm 69:22)

German pretzels – bread twists (*pictured*) simply made with salt, yeast, flour and water – are believed

to have been invented specifically as a Lenten food by an Italian monk in the early Middle Ages. Designed to help Christians to live the penitential season with prayer and simplicity, the treat's shape resembles hands in prayer, forming three holes representing the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

### Your ward clerk writes...

At our last ward meeting in November, we had an update on the 20mph application for Bothenhampton & Walditch Ward that was submitted to Dorset Council (DC) in August 2025. DC confirmed that all applications submitted during 2025 will be presented to the internal 20mph panel in February 2026. The panel's role is to authorise progression to Stage 2, a formal public consultation. In November there were 19 similar applications across the DC area, so given the high volume of applications the panel may recommend a staggered approach to Stage 2 consultations to ensure the process remains manageable. We will provide further updates as we know more.

Work to clear vegetation and make repairs to the Hollow Way high pavement was well under way during January, and was scheduled to be completed by the end of that month. The pavement has been closed for over a year, so residents will be pleased to have it reopened. Despite the necessary closure of the Hollow Way road during the works, thanks go to the DC team for allowing the road to be reopened each weekday between 4pm and 8am and at the weekends.

Continuing the road theme, we enjoyed a bright, dry and cold festive period followed by hard winter frosts, before Storm Goretti brought strong winds and heavy rain, and these alternating weather conditions are having quite an impact on our road infrastructure. As a reminder, if you spot any issues on our roads such as drainage and flooding, potholes, hedge, tree and verge problems, please use the reporting portal on

the Dorset Council website: [www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/w/report-a-problem-on-the-road-or-pavement](http://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/w/report-a-problem-on-the-road-or-pavement). You will need to provide the location and description of the issue and, if possible, photographs to help with investigation. Reports submitted to the portal can be made anonymously if you prefer.

### Images of 'Georgian gem' St Swithun's

St Swithun's is one of Bridport's most distinctive buildings. Set just north of the east/west orientation of the town, it rather "hides its light under a bushel," to quote from the Sermon on the Mount.

Plans for this Georgian building of note began when the congregation of the early 1800s decided to relocate their worship closer to town. The new church was designed by Charles Wallis and completed in 1827, and

as Sir Nikolaus Pevsner writes in *Buildings of England*, it is a "Georgian gem" noted for its "delightful front".

Fast forward to the 2020s, and after the present congregation realised that the building badly needed a fundamental refurbishment, it has been through a very thorough external makeover, with improvements and repairs that have made it ready for its 200th anniversary in 2027.

When we first invited the general public to come in and give their views at an open day in 2022, we started to attract some artistic interest. We were lucky enough to receive two images from local artist Brian Smith. The one reproduced here (*opposite page, top left*) is a very striking representation using digital art techniques.

Brian says: "The St Swithun's depiction was a digitally produced image using my iPad and pen. I had a little fun experimenting with a new art program! The colours were supposed to represent the light and vibrancy of the church and its people."

More recently, local illustrator Terry Whitworth made a wonderful colour print of St Swithun's (*above right*) following its external renovation. Terry often

sketches local buildings and frequently writes down his musings to accompany the artwork. Here is an excerpt from the piece he wrote as he sketched St Swithun's:

"Not so long ago, I headed out towards North Allington. Through a heavy, squeaky wrought-iron gate and up a well-trodden, narrow pathway, overhung with flowering shrubs – and there it was! A beautiful neo-Greek-styled church, circular bell tower, four sturdy columns, all painted white with pastel pink and ochre elevations. With deep azure sky above and a soaring temperature... was I still in Bridport or had I been somehow transorted to some remote hilltop chapel on a small Greek island? I chose the Greek option... and settled down for some serious scribbling!

"After about an hour, the relentless sun told me it was time to leave. Maybe stop off at a small hillside taverna... just a few steps back down the crazy-paved

path and out through the same heavy, squeaky wrought-iron gate and I realised that the taverna was just a fantasy too far!"

Rounding off the recent refurbishment, the final task on the church exterior was to light its cupola and gild its weathervane. These works were a wonderful way to 'top off' the extensive restoration of the exterior. This wonderful photo (*above left*) was taken by Nigel Green just after the mayor of Bridport had formally switched on the lights to the sound of a triumphant trumpeter!

If you haven't been along to view the newly refurbished building, do go and take a look. Any time is good but, after sunset is particularly atmospheric.

### Round and about the Bay

How many of you look up to the sky and marvel at how in continually changes? In early December we were treated to a very unusual 'anvil' cloud formation (*cumulonimbus incus*). The rising red sky formed the backdrop for large, flat anvil-shaped clouds; this usually means severe weather and is most commonly found

in the Amazon, South East Asia and the Congo Basin, so it was indeed a rare treat for us. That night also saw the 'cold' moon – so called because it signifies winter's arrival – and the 'supermoon' because its orbit brings it close to Earth, making it brighter than usual.

There have been another two rockfalls recently. The one in the photo (*above right*) is at the end of the promenade and produced some rather large boulders. The one on East Beach came in the afternoon when people were walking along the beach – some had lucky escapes as the tide was quite high at the time.

The Boxing Day swim was cancelled out of respect for the two swimmers who sadly lost their lives on Christmas Day at Budleigh Salterton. The difference in the sea between the two days was remarkable: rough on Christmas Day, calm on Boxing Day. We can only marvel at our world with its constantly changing seas,

climates and sky... maybe we just don't appreciate it all.

Despite the cold, the swimmers have been taking the plunge, and have been making use of the sauna to warm up. Also spotted at the beginning of January on a cold, calm, sunny, cloud-free day were two of the gigs out practising (*one is pictured left*). They definitely would have needed something to warm them up!

The tea shop by the car park has changed hands and undergone a revamp; the owners hope to open again in February. It's always popular with those arriving by coach. The Cornish Bakery also does really well over the Christmas period and has kept its summer opening times for those hardy souls out first thing.

Today as you walk round the harbour there are kiosks and the harbourmaster's building on the Mound, but do you know what was there previously? In 1901 the Pavilion was built on a raised area near the harbour's West Pier, part of the development of West Bay as a tourist destination. It provided refreshments for the holiday trade but there was a constant battle with the sea, land slippage and destructive gales all taking their toll. It was demolished in 1942 and then work started on what today is known as the Mound.

Dorset Police hope to have a pop-up community contact point at West Bay in the future. We will publicise details of this on our Facebook page once we have them.

Dorset Council is dealing with a large backlog of 20mph applications from around the county, and it plans to submit these (including the application for West Bay) to an internal panel in February 2026 for

consideration. There will then be a public consultation further down the line.

The West Bay/Bridport weekend shuttle bus service currently has funding to continue running until Easter. Funding after this point is being considered, and grants and other funding streams are being investigated. It costs £600 per weekend to run this service. Unfortunately, bus services will never cover their own costs, hence the need for alternative funding sources.

Paul Wyatt and other volunteers have been continuing their beach cleans, for which we are very grateful. It is amazing to be blessed with such fabulous locals who care so much for their environment.

A reminder that West Bay Discovery Centre will be open over half term (14–22 February) every day from 11am to 4pm. Then from 28 February to 15 March it ➔

will be open on Saturdays and Sundays only from 11am to 4pm. From 17 March to 1 November it will be open Tuesday to Sunday from 11am to 4pm. The centre offers a treasure trove of information about West Bay in a beautifully restored Methodist chapel on the beach. Their award-winning visitor centre has something to interest all ages and the interactive activities are particularly popular with families. It's a fun way to learn about the Jurassic Coast, forces of nature, shipbuilding, tourism, local industry, trails and walks and information about the filming of Broadchurch. There's a range of visitor information and a small gift shop whose range includes quality local products. Admission is free but donations are welcome.

The next ward meeting is on Wednesday 11 March at 6.30pm at The Salt House. All ward residents are welcome to attend. This is a relaxed and friendly environment for you to raise items of concern in the ward to your councillors.

### Hope and promise for the new year

*Be alert, be present. I'm about to do something brand-new. It's bursting out! Don't you see it? (Isaiah 43:19 The Message Translation)*

At the start of a new year, acutely aware of new starts, resolutions and hopes, I was speaking with someone who, looking back at all the world and national events



of 2025, rather depressingly suggested there wasn't much to look forward to in 2026. Initially I was left in a sort of silent agreement – and to be honest the first weeks of January haven't exactly been encouraging.

But then I thought to look back over my own personal year, and I surprised myself with how many positive things I had experienced. From short trips to longer trans-continental journeys, wonderful art exhibitions, exciting choral events, lovely local walks, and beautiful interactions with lovely folk in churches and around the town. Oh, and then I found that, although I had always professed having zero artistic ability, I could actually prepare and oversee children in Messy Church to produce really quite presentable craft work!

At a recent Soul Space service (a monthly informal cafe-style afternoon service) we all worked together in one activity, producing stunning paper stars. Who knew that worship could be so creative and such fun?

This reminded me that when this prophecy in Isaiah was written, its positive message was to people still in exile, several generations after their nation had been conquered and its capital destroyed. Amid all that, it proclaimed a message of hope and promise.

I wonder if it is too easy to look at the negative elements of life and concentrate on problems rather than looking for solutions. Some elements of the media seem obsessed with catastrophising, so negativity is not surprising if we follow their lead.



Is it too much to suggest that we take a gentle breath and remember that there are positives in there too? Climate change is indeed a massive challenge – but, slow though our responses have been, there are positive developments in renewable energy and greater awareness of the cost of our western lifestyles. Looking back at services I have led in the past, I see that some places I was praying for then are now in relative peace. So maybe, just maybe, if we keep on praying for the current trouble spots, the situations there will settle too.

We can but hope so, not to mention being encouraged to remember the positives in our lives – those little bright spots that surprise us, make us smile and bring joy into our lives. Can we see the brand new ‘something’ that is bursting out and waiting to be seen?

### The hand of greed

Recently, after our weekday Mass in Beaminster, I was discussing with one of our regular parishioners the meaning of Matthew 19:24 – “It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.” He remembered reading an article about John Densmore, who is best known as the drummer with the rock band The Doors. According to Densmore, at the height of the band’s fame, he found himself addicted to money. He remembers a time when he had a little sports car and thinking: just a little more and I’ll be happy! That



feeling of wanting more and more was getting to him.

In the 1980s he began to tithe 10% of his income to environment organisations such as Rainforest Action Network and other organisations. Recalling Oliver Stone’s 1991 film about The Doors, which paid the band handsomely for the use of their music, Densmore said: “I looked down at my hand signing those tithing cheques and it was shaking. It was the hand of greed, right there in me!”

We might like to reflect this week on whether we to are addicted to money. Is it an instrument for good in our lives or do we find ourselves making decisions based on our desire for material things? Do we recognise ourselves in the rich young man (Mark 10) who, when challenged by Jesus, sadly walks away?

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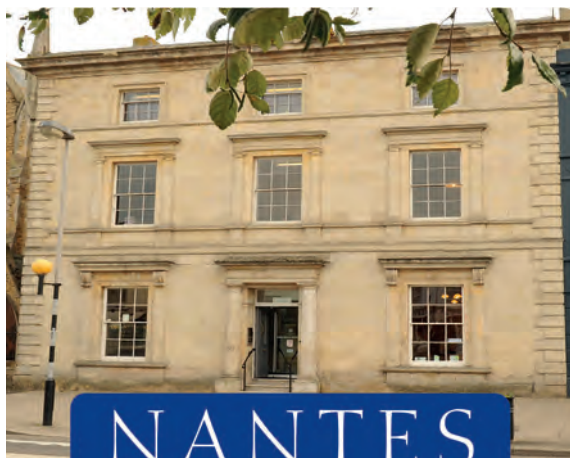
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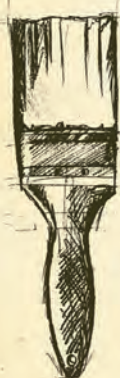
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
